Great Western. ASKS SUPPORT FROM OMAHA

Bays Great Western Helped to Organtee Grain Exchange and to Make This Leading Grain Market.

Fully 400 of the husiness men of Omaha and a large number of women of the city greeted President Felton of the Chicago Great Western Railroad company when yesterday he spoke at theluncheon tendered him by the public affairs committee of the Omaha Commercial club. The luncheon was spread in the club's large banquet hall, which was filled to capacity.

The speakers' table was at the west side of the banquet hall, and with President Felton sat directors and officers of the Great Western, other railroad men of the city and a number of the business men. He was introduced by President Mohler of the Union Pacific, who refrained from making an extended speech, saying that he did not desire to steal any of the thunder of the speaker As Mr. Felton arose he was greeted with a loud and long clapping of hands. He briefly reviewed the early history of the Great Western and the incidents leading up to its being built into this city. He pointed to the fact that in 1904 Omaha was without a primary grain market and that there was but one grain elevator here. At this time it was, he asserted, that the Great Western decided that Omaha should be placed upon the map as a grain market for the vast agricultural contry tributary, adding:

Omaha's Natural Location. 'It was to the interest of the through lines to retain the long haul on grain to Chicago and the south and this proved a distinct disability, so far as Omaha was concerned, because it deprived this point of the advantage of its natural location.

'Upon completion of the Omaha extension the Great Western had a line to the Mississippi river, Chicago and the Twin Cities, and immediately proceeded to publish proportional rates, with a view to putting this city on the map and establishing it as a primary grain market.

Asks, Omaha's Support. 'I trust that you gentlemen will be impressed with the fact that the Great Western has played a substantial part in the development of your grain market. and that we are not unreasonable in asking substantial support at yer hands in our efforts to develop our business and

"The systems of roads reaching Omaha from Chicago, not including the Great Western, aggregate 29,369 miles, of which the mileage between Omaha and Chicago is but 6 per cent of the whole, while in the case of the Great Western, one-third of its total mileage is between the two cities. In other words, we have a much larger percentage of our line which is nt on the business of Omaha and, for that reason, are we not justified in claiming that the Great Western is more distinctively an Omaha line?"

President Felton referred to the Great Western's extensive terminals in Omaha and the elevator facilities of the road and show that the company's line between here and Chicago is but sixteen miles longer than the shortest and eight miles shorter than the longest, "and," he added, "we are the shortest line to the Twin Cities by twenty miles." In conclusten he said:
