

### RUSSIANS RETAKE CITY OF JAROSLAV

Russian Troops Recapture the Place and Take Five Thousand Prisoners.

### AUSTRIANS RETREAT ALONG SAN

Emperor, Grand Duke Nicholas and General Staff Attend Religious Services After News of Victory is Received.

**BULLETIN.**  
PARIS, Nov. 6.—Grand Duke Nicholas, commander-in-chief of the Russian forces in the field, has sent a telegram to General Joffre, commander-in-chief of the French forces, saying the Russians have gained in East Prussia the greatest victory since the beginning of the war.

**PETROGRAD, Nov. 6.**—(Via London.)—The Russians have recaptured the Galician city of Jaroslava and have taken 5,000 Austrian prisoners, according to a telegram received here from Lemberg. Jaroslava is seventeen miles northwest of the Austrian fortress of Przemyel.

The Austrian attempts to cut off the Russian attackers, the message says, finally have broken down and the Austrians are now in retreat along the San River.

An official statement, issued by the general staff, says:  
"The emperor, the Grand Duke Nicholas, the Russian commander-in-chief, the imperial suite and all the members of the general staff attended the religious services which were celebrated when news was received that the Austrians had retreated all along the Galician front."

**British Warships Damaged.**  
CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 6.—(Via Sofia and London.)—According to a Turkish official announcement one of the British warships bombarding the Dardanelles was struck by a shot from one of the forts and an explosion on board resulted. A British steamer, it is also stated, has been sunk off Alvali, Asia Minor, after the crew and cargo had been put ashore.

### PROCLAIMS HOLY WAR OF FAITHFUL

Sheik-ul-Islam Issues Decree Declaring Duty of Every Moslem is to His Creed.

### ARMY UPON INDIAN BORDER

Ameer of Afghanistan Said to Have Force of 170,000 Men, with 135 Guns, Along the Frontier.

**BERLIN, Nov. 6.**—(By Wireless)—A report received here from Constantinople says that the Ameer of Afghanistan has sent an army of 170,000 men with 135 guns to the Indian frontier. This news was given out in official quarters in Berlin today to the press.

The railroad from Herat to Kushk has been destroyed.

A number of Indian border tribes have joined the Afghans.

British officials on the border have been arrested and several of their number have been killed.

An advance of Turkish troops in the Sinai peninsula in the direction of Egypt is reported in Berlin from Switzerland.

The Turkish army operating against Egypt is said to number a quarter of a million men. This news was given officially to the press in Berlin today.

**Proclaims Holy War.**  
According to information given out in official quarters today in the press, the sheik-ul-Islam, the chief ecclesiastical dignitary of Mohammedanism in Turkey, has issued a decree in Constantinople, saying that in the fighting with Russia, England and France, the duty of every Mussulman is to his faith. This decree has been spread throughout the Mohammedan world and announced to the pilgrims at Mecca.

News given out officially for the press today says that the hard fighting in the northwest continues, but that it is yet without result. The Germans have, however, been able to make slow advances at several points from Tyres inland.

**Clash in Poland Expected.**  
The clash in Poland which has been expected for several days past has not yet developed. One reason is that the condition of the roads make rapid movements impossible. The cold weather is now making some improvement in this regard.

No exact information as to the position of the Teutonic allies is available. The Russians are undoubtedly in superior force, a condition to which they are seeking to overcome by advantages in position.

Farther to the south the Austrians continued to harass the enemy. No day passes, according to this information given out in Berlin, without a report of the capture of a thousand or more prisoners.

The improvement in the situation on the western front is shown by orders to reopen in parts of Alsace schools which had been closed owing to the danger of invasion.

### TEACHERS VOTE TO TAKE THE SCHOOLS OUT OF POLITICS

proper development along the most advanced lines of vocational work.

"Believing that our rural schools need better trained teachers, and also believing that rural teachers should be in full sympathy with rural life, we recommend that our normal schools establish a special rural department, which shall seek to train young men and young women reared in the country for such rural school work, putting emphasis on the problems peculiar to country life.

**To Prevent Crime.**  
"Believing that crime is the result of abnormal conditions and that the penitentiary, the jail, the reform school and the police court have not secured the needed correction, therefore we recommend for the care of the criminal, sanitary hospitals, manned by experts in their several lines—places where by scientific treatment the tendencies toward evil may be removed and crime really prevented."

"Believing that public education would be improved by making provision for the retirement of teachers incapacitated by illness or length of service, we recommend that the legislature be requested to provide a system of state pension laws for teachers."

**Purposes of Schools.**  
Dr. Robert Wenley, head of the philosophy department of Michigan, and Prof. L. D. Coffman of the University of Illinois were the speakers at the final general session of the association. Prof. Coffman said the threefold purpose of the public schools is to "protect, educate and select." Dr. Wenley spoke from the subject, "The Whole Man."

At 2 o'clock the enrollment reached an even 4,000, as against 4,000 last year. But 400 teachers who were not actively teaching were not enrolled this year, although they applied. The enrollment is of actual teachers only.

The voting for officers was scattered, no candidate for the nomination for president appearing prominently. At least fifty candidates will be voted on for president. The five high candidates will be voted on by mail when the nominations are announced.

**Convention Highlights.**  
The resolutions committee—A. H. Dixon, H. H. Hahn, H. W. Caldwell and Miss Clara Mackin—recommended that "definite plans be formed in every school to get young people to have a pride in planning to assume this world leadership for peace, now that the future of civilization is endangered by the actual war that involves the former leaders of the world's future. Further, the committee recommended: "American people be trained to recognize that wealth should be regarded only as the means to enable the people to develop their art, science, music, the city beautiful; to forward the spirit of social service, of devotion, of courage, thoroughness and efficiency."  
The Omaha Purity bureau, headed by E. V. Parrish, was congratulated by the entire association in a resolution unanimously passed because of the complete success of the association meetings. Mr. Parrish was on the job twenty hours a day and slept only one or two hours the rest of the time. He prophesied that 4,000 would attend the convention, and the prophecy came true, although but 4,000 enrolled. A large number could not qualify to enroll. In his own mind Parrish believed that 12,000 of the 12,000 teachers of the state ought to come, and hoped they would.

### VILLA OFFERS TO RESIGN COMMAND

General Tells Convention He Will Retire if Necessary to Eliminate Carranza.

### VILLISTAS GUARD CONVENTION

Five Thousand Men Sent as Request of Members—Civil War Probably Depends Upon the Action of Gonzales.

**BULLETIN.**  
EL PASO, Tex., Nov. 6.—The Carranza troops have retired before an advance of 10,000 Villa soldiers after fighting twenty miles south of Aguas Calientes, according to an official Villa report today. General Leon commanded the Carranza forces.

**WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.**—General Villa has formally notified the national convention at Aguas Calientes of his willingness to resign command of his troops and retire to private life if that is necessary to bring about the elimination of General Carranza.

The convention, according to official reports received here today, received Villa's communication with a tumult of applause. No action was taken on it, pending the report of a commission which went to Puebla to notify Carranza of the selection of General Gutierrez as provisional president.

**Much Depends Upon Gonzales.**  
Villa's statement is in answer to the stipulation of General Carranza that with his own retirement Villa and Zapata should be eliminated from military authority. According to reports from American Consul Silliman, resistance by Carranza of the convention's orders will depend on the attitude of General Pablo Gonzalez, commander of the division of the east. He is at Queretaro with several thousand troops and indications are that he will remain loyal to Carranza. Carranza's visit to Obregon, commander of the division of the northwest, if it is believed by officials here, may have an important bearing on the situation, as Obregon had declared his loyalty to the convention and will endeavor to persuade Carranza not to plunge Mexico into another civil war.

Five thousand Villa troops were invited to Aguas Calientes by the convention to guard the city, according to today's dispatches, when General Gonzales had assumed a threatening attitude at his headquarters, a hundred miles south of Aguas Calientes. Thereupon the delegates telegraphed Villa to send a force to defend the city against attack. No fighting had taken place when today's report was dispatched, both sides awaiting the outcome of the conferences at Puebla.

**Gutierrez Will Give Guarantees.**  
Gutierrez has stated to American agents that as soon as he is sworn in as provisional president he will issue the proclamation giving the guarantees desired by the United States before withdrawing his forces from Vera Cruz. Villa has agreed to support Gutierrez in enforcing the proclamation which Carranza declined to issue.

High officials here, however, said today that such a proclamation would not be sufficient to bring about the American evacuation while the forces of General Aguilar, who is loyal to Carranza, is in command of the state of Vera Cruz. Should Villa send a force to that vicinity, and demonstrate that his troops are able to back up the guarantees, American troops then might be withdrawn.

### Pontiff Writes to Mexican Archbishop

ROME, Nov. 6.—Pope Benedict, writing under date of October 25, sent a paternal letter to the archbishop of Mexico, comforting him and the Mexican episcopate in their distressing situation, in that they have been almost all forced into exile.

The pontiff encourages the Mexican clergy to trust in a better future and says that he adds his prayers to theirs for the triumph of the church and justice.

In the meantime he sends them money for the aid of such priests as have been deprived of their possessions, as well as to succor the congregations driven from their homes. He regrets that his poverty does not permit him to send more.

Reports received at the Vatican depict as disastrous the present condition of the Catholic church in Mexico. According to this information, priests have been expelled from their dioceses and exiled to Vera Cruz or to the United States; sacred images have been broken and trampled upon and churches have been used for barracks, stables and public dancing halls. Mexican leaders have not refrained from persecuting the church, according to these reports to the Vatican. General Villa ordered the hanging of Jesuits and Christian Brothers and General Carranza ordered the confiscation of property of the clergy.

These reports contain a long list of indignities to the church, which include insults to the clergy and cries of "Down with the pope."
