NEW YORK, Nov. 6.-Unusual u tainty surrounds the outcome of the leading foot ball games to be played in the east tomorrow. Almost without exception the principal university elevens face opponents whose records this season warrant the prediction of exceedingly hardfought, close contests.

The feature games of the day include the annual Harvard-Princeton contest at Cambridge and the intersectional struggle between the Army and Notre Dame at West Point The meeting of Harvard and Princeton

brings together only two of the so-called Big Five teams which have not as yet met defeat upon the foot ball field this fall, though each has been held to a tie game during the last four weeks.
