Incidentally commercial paper was accepted for the shorter periods at a fraction under 5 per cent. In line with this general movement it was also learned that the stock exchange authorities will, within a short time, order the removal of certain restrictions which have operated against the purchase and sale of high class securities. It is not implied, however, that anything like regular operations will be permitted.

Listed stocks were higher in the unofficial market, and on the curb a majority of the standard oil issues were quoted at prices above July 30 closing quotations. Foreign exchange was once more a negligible factor, so far as London was concerned. Bills on that certer were virtually unchanged from the recent prices but Paris cables and checks were sold at 3,10% and 5,11%, respectively. Recurrent activity in exchange on Italy was seen in the quotations for laires, which were supposed to reflect purchases of foodstuff and merchandise here for Italian interests.

There was more than the usual divergence of opinion respecting the weekly cash movement, but on the surface it would appear that local banks.

Centinued improvement in sentiment, additional case in money market matters, increased interest in stocks and bonds at higher prices, heavy grain exports, sustained demand for war materials at remanerative prices, high prices for creuls and live stock, somewhat better conditions and undeniable betterment in the southern cotton situation, due to a rise in exports, furnish a budget of favorable news this week.

In the other hand there is considerable idleness, which reduces the purchasing power in many sections, and warm weather adversely affected retail trade, while likewise restricting reorders.
