Little Change in West. No noteworthy change in France or Beigium was reported during the morning. The latest British official statement mentioned a decreased vigor in the German attacks in West Flanders, while the French communication said that the battie was as violent as ever. The allies are reported as driving forward in the vicinity of Dixmude and were, at last accounts, taking the offensive south and east of Ypres, the point where since last week the Germans have been endeavoring to get through.

Many dispatches speak of a stream of German reinforcements and allies in their official statements have taken cognisance of the changed complexion of these fresh troops. It is pointed out that vast numbers of raw men may have proved inferior to a smaller and better trained force, as the repulse of German mixed forces along the Yser would indicate and that the use of more first line troops in West Flanders may mean less prodigality that seems to have characterized the former German rushes.

More Soldiers in West. A hundred and fifty thousand Germans it is said, will be moved to Belgium from Muenster, Prussia, next week, while troops, who fought near Sedan already are in West Flanders.

Pending decisive developments op any of the European fields of battle, the fall of Tsing Tau held first place in the attention of military men today. Official reports from Tokio show that it was not without desperate resistance that the German garrison, vastly outnumbered by British and Japanese, gave up the fight. For days the German forces have been subjected to a withering fire from land and sea.

"Suddenly," says the official report from Tokio, "the flag of surrender ran up in the morning breeze on the weather bureau mount, towering above the ser and land."

Nothwithstanding Russian claims to an overwhelming success in the east, there is nothing to show that the German and Austrian forces have met great disaster, and although they were compelled to retreat, they apparently were able to fall back upon strongly fortified positions, selected in advance.

Russia, in an official statement, makes claim that the resistance of the enemy has been broken, after fighting of several weeks along a front of 350 miles. This campaign has now been closed in the opinion of the Russian military authorities, who say that a new period of the war will be inaugurated.

## KAISER ORDERS ANOTHER ATTACK ON BRITISH LINES

Germans Will Make One More Attempt to Take Calais Before Great Battle in East.

QUICK ACTION IS IMPERATIVE

Emperor Sees Need of Victory in Belgium Before Troops Must Be Sent to Other Frontier.

WILLIAM NEAR FIRING LINE

Dined with Staff at Ghent and Returned to Headquarters Dissatisfied with Outlook.

Attempt to Hold East Line Pending Victory in West.

RUMOR OF NAVAL ACTIVITY

Dutch Fishing Boats Find Many Mines and Bodies Floating in the North Sen-Fishing is

Practically Suspended.

LONDON. Nov. 7 .- "It is announced from Berlin that the German emperor has ordered one more attempt to vanquish the British army and force a way to Calais before the great battle is fought near the Silesian frontier," says a dispatch to the Daily Mail from Copenhagen. The

message continues: "For this purpose all available forces were brought up, it being realized that in event of the defeat of the German army before Breslau it will become imperative for the Germans to confine themselves to acting on the defensive in France and Belgiam in order to send big forces to Silecia."

LONDON, Nov. 7.-Mystery again cloaks the movements of the antagonists along the battle fronts in the eastern arena of the war, but the belief is growing in London that Germany, safe within its defenses, behind the river Warthe, and with the Austrians behind strongly fortified positions from Cracow to the passes of the Carpathians, is rushing its best eastern corps to France in a final desperate effort to smash the allies' line blocking the way to Calain, Petrograd reports that the Austrians, after making a final furious onslaught on the Russian lines along the river San, had withdrawn in all directions, until their front now extends from Dukla Pass in the Carpathians to Craeow, with a wedge extending to Przemysl, which
