NEW BANK IS OPENED HERE

German-American Receives Deposits All Ready for Business.

OFFICERS ARE NEWCOMERS

Have Great Confidence in This City and See Prosperity in Spite of the Present Business Stringency.

The German-American State bank, Omaha's newest banking institution, opened its doors to the public for business yesterday morning at 9 o'clock. The new bank is on the first floor of the seven-story Trade building on the Farnam and Sixteenth street corner.

The bank is capitalized at \$500,000. As it acts as a state bank under the state laws of Nebraska, deposits are protected by the Nebraska law for that purpose. Fred R. Baker, formerly of Bloomington, Ill., New York City and Denver, is president of the institution. E. L. Thomas is vice president. James P. Hackett, cashier, and E. C. Goerke, assistant cashier. Mr. Thomas was formerly in the banking business at Danvers, Fullerton and Purdum, all towns in this state. Mr. Hackett was with the McLean County bank at Bloomington, Ill., for eleven years and Mr. Goerke was with the First National bank at Osceola and later with the City National bank here.

The board of directors consists of the four officers and H. L. Ottensmeyer of Omaha, A. H. Fricke of Papillion, E. F. Goerke of Burr, Neb., and Frank R. Baker of Bloomington, Ill.

Mr. Hackett declares the prospects for the future are abundant and, despite the fact that they are opening for business during rather strained business conditions, he believes the prosperity of Nebraska will assure a profitable business for the German-American bank even though European wars or other disasters hinder slightly.

The highest vote cast was for Treasurer J. P. Matthews of Grand Island for reelection.

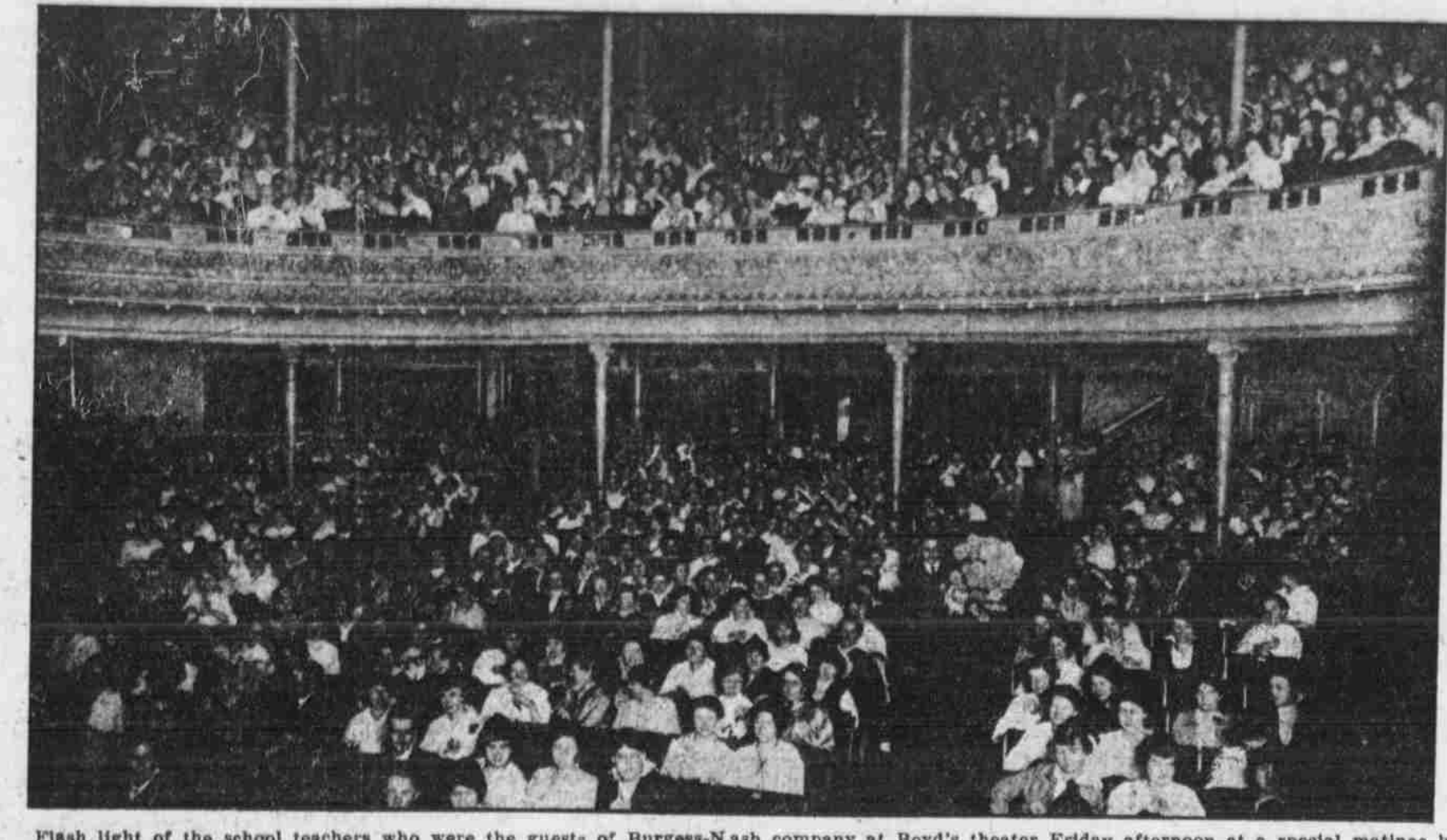
Give Words of Appreciation.
