TEUTONS RETIRE BEHIND WARTHE

German Forces Withdraw from Before Warsaw to River Nearer Prussian Force.

BIG FIGHTS ARE IMPRACTICAL

Battle Along Coast Near Danzig Must Be Made in Form of Light Attacks—Situation There in the Balance.

BERLIN, Nov. 7.—(Via The Hague and London, Nov. 7.)—The first reference showing the direction and extent of the German retreat from before Warsaw was contained today in a report mentioning the defeat of the Russian cavalry near Kolo, twenty-five miles from the German frontier. This shows that the Germans have retired behind the Warthe river, which, roughly parallels the German eastern frontier. According to Major Morsh, military correspondent of the Berliner Tageblatt, the German forces have also probably been with-

COMPENSATION LAW SHOWS A GOOD LEAD

Hollenbeck Also Stays Ahead of Reese in Race for the Chief Justiceship.

HOAGLAND IS STILL GAINING

Democrats Leading for Offices of Auditor, Treasurer and Attorney General—Suffrage Behind Eleven Thousand.

A feature of the late compilation of election returns is the victory of the workmen's compensation law which in fifty-eight counties received a majority of more than 3,000 votes. CONVENTION MUST GO, SAYS CARRANZA

General Issues Decree Ordering Aguas Calientes Body Virtually to Dissolve November 10.

ALL GENERALS SHALL REPORT

Manifesto Followed by Another Commanding All Government Employees to Obey None But the First Chief.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Nov. 8.—General Carranza published a decree in Mexico City today ordering the Aguas Calientes convention virtually dissolved by November 10, according to a dispatch received here today from R. L. McClary, chief of the Carranza publicity staff in Mexico City.

The decree ordered all generals who are in attendance in persons to report to their commands no later than November 10 at 6 o'clock in the afternoon. All officers of lesser rank than general, who are representing superior officers, are to report from the convention and to report to the first chief or their own respective commanders.

Corps Notified.

The army corps, whose commanders have dissolved the first chief, have been notified that the officer next in charge will assume command at once and report by telegraph to the first chief as soon as possible. The decree adds:

"The officers are to elect another general and report the result to Carranza."

This decree was followed by another ordering all government employees to obey none but the first chief.

ARMY OF RUSSIA NOW DOMINATES WAR SITUATION

(Continued from Page One.)

The experts seem to place more credence on the reports of reinforcements, and the coming week is looked forward to as one of the most crucial of the war.

Cossack raids across the German border and Berlin now admits that the Russians are well beyond the Warthe river. The Russian advance has been made over bad roads at the amazing rate of fourteen miles daily, and the German retreat has now passed Czernostowa without stopping. The Russian line is well back of the Warthe, between Czernostowa and Kalisz.

Another Petrograd report states that Czernostowa is still held as the last German position in Russia, but that it is regarded as untenable. The latest Paris official communications states that the invaders are concentrating their activities about Ypres without as yet achieving any results. The allies are reported as holding their own everywhere on the Aisne, while to the northwest of Belgium they have reached a new position on the Vregy plateau.

German Advance in Argonne.

An official announcement given out in Berlin declares that advances have been made in the Argonne, but that there is nothing new elsewhere.

Holland, determined to preserve the neutrality of the river, Schiedt, has announced that the Fishing forts will fire on any vessel not recognized as a mail boat or other regular harbor craft.

Private reports reaching Bern, Switzerland from Constantinople indicate that Turkey has entered the war with an empty treasury. It has exhausted the German loan and used up the money derived from the tax on imports.

KAISER FAILS IN ATTACK ON YPRES

alled line at Arras, forty miles further to the south, but not with the same fury as they exhibited on the onslaught of the last week.

"So fierce has been the fighting around Ypres that the casualties of the Germans are believed to have reached the enormous figure of 100,000, though these figures may prove to have been exaggerated."

British Bombarter Turks.

The correspondent of Reuters' Telegram company at Athens says:

"Two British destroyers bombarded the telegraph stations at Sarnoussak and Ayasmat. The Turks sank a Greek steamer that was flying the British flag at Alvali."

The Greek inhabitants of Smyrna are fleeing, panic-stricken. A British destroyer went to Alvali to embark the British consul, but the Turks refused to permit this.

"It is stated that Furtz Soelie Bahr and Kum Kale, in the Dardanelles, have been completely destroyed by the bombardment. The Turks, under the direction of German officers, are hastily fortifying Alvali."

A dispatch from Copenhagen quotes the Politiken as saying that three German officers, wearing civilian dress, arrived safely at Copenhagen on the Danish steamer Eron, which sailed from Baltimore on October 4. According to the paper, the officers were provided with what purported to be passports issued by the Swiss consulate general in New York. British warships in the Atlantic searched the Eron without discovering the disguised Germans.

Lull at Dixmude and Ypres is Prelude to Still Larger Battle

PARIS, Nov. 8.—The lull in the fighting in the western front at Dixmude and Ypres, in the best judgment here, is only the prelude of a further effort to which all the forces that the Germans can raise will be concentrated. The last attack made with twelve army corps called. The next will be made by even more.

All advice from the front indicates this clearly. The report that the Germans are gathering an important army at Ingelmunster, the affirmation that the battle against France must be decided at an early date, the orders given to the German generals to break through before the end of the month and the various movements of troops observed by aviators in Belgium all tend to show the purpose of the Germans.

All of the military writers here agree that the effort will be of the first importance to the Germans. If unsuccessful it is contended here, it will be the last the Germans will be able to make as they will then recognize the necessity of falling back on a line a little more to the rear which will be as their custom have been fortified in advance with the greatest possible care.

They will, therefore, strain every nerve in this battle of Ypres and the fighting is likely to be of a character even more intense than anything that has gone before. If the allies successfully resist the new onslaught in the opinion of military writers the day when France will be freed of the invaders will be brought sensibly nearer.

GERMANS SENDING TROOPS TO THE EAST

Many Trains Leaving Belgium to Reinforce Teuton Army in Prussia.

CARRIAGES MARKED PETROGRAD

General Movement into Germany Noted from Brussels and Liege Soldiers Saying They Will Fight Russians.

(Copyright, 1914, by Press Publishing Co., ROTTERDAM, Nov. 8.—(Special Cablegram to New York World and Omaha Bee.)—The Germans are now announcing to the people of Belgium that they welcome the foundations near Nieuport, as they shorten the line which Germans must defend on this front. A Dutch correspondent says that many trains of infantry and cavalry and guns are leaving via Brussels and Louvain for Germany. Wagons and carriages are marked for Petrograd.

Soldiers say there is no more fighting on the Yser and they are now going to fight the Russians. The Bruges correspondent of the Nieuws Rotterdamse Courant states that the aeroplane sheds at Knafelac have been taken down by the Germans and sent to an unknown destination.

Troops are moving from Bruges in an easterly direction, he says, and machine guns have been mounted on hills and towers in the town. A Liege correspondent declares that numerous trains have carried troops and materials into Germany, and a correspondent of a Maestricht paper states that on Thursday night for three hours cavalry defiled across the Meuse bridge toward Germany. This is not confirmed from other sources.
