DEFINES SCOPE OF OPERATIONS OF THE BANKS

The question of double and single name commercial paper. It did make it exceedingly clear, however, that it had a preference for the two name sort, and left no room for the authorities of the banks to insist that it expected careful inquiry into one name paper presented to them for rediscunt.

Insight Into Economic Changes. The circular discussed the conditions that have arisen here and throughout the world through the war, and gave some insight into the economic changes which might be expected as a result.

"It should be borne in mind that," it said, "although our exports are showing a gratifying increase, there is still a large cash balance due to European countries, for which gold may be demanded and which will be required to meet the needs of the American securities held abroad may be returned to the United States, while on the other hand, more than \$300,000,000 of emergency currency must be gradually retired.

"No one can estimate the duration of the war or predict what will be the financial or commercial conditions when peace shall be restored. Our own industrial development has been greatly facilitated by foreign capital, and we have been accustomed to borrow large sums annually in Europe and to sell American securities there, which attracted foreigners because of the higher rates compared with European investments.

Higher Than Before Likely. It is probable that at the end of the war rates in Europe will be higher than they have been in the past and greater investment returns will be yielded. The tremendous destruction of property and waste of capital will not only check the flow of European savings to the United States, but may dispose foreign investors to return the securities they now hold.

Lower money rates in this country would be likely to counteract this tendency, while, on the other hand, high interest rates and larger investment returns on our side would check it.

The function of the federal reserve banks is, therefore, of a two-fold character. They should extend credit facilities particularly where the abnormal conditions now prevailing have created emergency demands for prompt accommodations, and on the other hand they must protect the gold holdings of this country in order that such holdings may remain available to meet demands that may be made upon them.

Should Act with Caution. While credit facilities should be liberally extended in some parts of the country it would appear advisable to proceed with caution in districts not in need of immediate relief, and to await the effect of the release of reserves and of the changes which the credit mechanism of the country is about to experience before establishing a definite discount policy.

GERMANS MAKING MAXIMUM EFFORTS

Tenton Forces Determined in Attacks Upon Points of Advantage Along North French Coast. CRITICS STUDY THE SITUATION

Advocates to Kaiser's Campaign See Where the Iron Ring of the Allies is Curtailing His Ambitions.

PARIS, Nov. 11.—It is becoming more and more evident to French observers that Germany is now making a maximum effort in Belgium to carry out its determination to penetrate the battle line of the allies with a frontal attack and reach either Dunkirk or Calais on the English channel.

This attack seems to be taking place south of Dixmude. What is described in an official bulletin as "very violent fighting" in the north, continued this morning. The foggy weather of the last few days apparently has cleared and the Germans are pushing the attack.

Nowadays, Paris seems well satisfied with the situation of the allies and the optimism of the last two weeks continues unabated.

Study German Position. The German position, however, is being given considerable close study. French military critics of the standpoint of strategy, regard the German position between two adversaries too far from each other for united efforts in the same operation, as a favorable one for the reason that it permits the use of what is called "internal lines."

This strategy is simple in the ordinary, but not always in the practice. A classical example of internal lines is found in the campaign of 1814 in France. Napoleon, holding the internal lines, beat the Austrian army at one point, and then after leaving sufficient force before the Austrian to hold them in check, proceeded by forced marches toward the Russian army, which he vanquished in its turn.

Nowadays, railroad transportation makes it possible to apply this maneuver to two points 1,000 miles apart. German railroads in particular lend themselves admirably to this procedure.

Situation Different Now. But there is an essential difference. French observers point out, between Napoleon's campaign of a century ago and that of William II. The operations of today were not begun in the same manner. The first draft of troops to east Prussia was not sent after a victory in France, but after a German defeat at Gumbinnen, and further drafts of troops now are being sent to the eastern arena.

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War Begun Between Villa and Carranza. EL PASO, Tex., Nov. 11.—War has been declared between the Carranza and Villa elements of the constitutional army, according to dispatches received at El Paso tonight from officials of the chieftains at Aguas Calientes.

A preliminary battle already has occurred at Leon, between the convention city and Queretaro, it was reported. General Pablo Gonzalez, the Carranza commander, has moved his forces from Queretaro north to Silao to meet the Villa advance. General Manuel Chao, a Villa chieftain, departed today from Aguas Calientes with a strong column.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—American troops probably will be ordered out of Vera Cruz very soon, leaving the Mexican factions, with their own differences, as a result of the recent developments, which have brought the guarantee of the Washington government demanded.

Carranza's promises not to reimpose customs dues collected by American officials during the occupation, and to protect natives who have served Brisard General Funston probably will be accepted as sufficient.

RUSSIAN ADVANCE SURPRISES KAISER

Movement of Army Across Frontier from Poland in November Thought Impossible. GERMANY RANSCAK Whole of East Germany for Men and Guns to Oppose Onslaught of Czar's Forces.

PETROGRAD, Nov. 11.—(Special Telegram to New York World and Omaha Bee.)—Russian light columns, which have crossed and dislocated the outer line of the German strategic railways running around central Poland, report feverish activity. They have been able to arrest German movements on the railway near the frontier, but farther back the German lines are crowded day and night by trains bringing troops and equipment, and especially artillery, from East Prussia to the positions behind Thorn and Posen.

Population in Panic. The excitement among the German railway staff has thrown the population into a panic. Many thousands of German families have hastily packed their portable belongings and have fled behind the fortress of Posen, fearing the Russian invaders. Others are abandoning their homes and making for Breslau and Dresden.

Evidently the German general staff was convinced that when the Russians had repulsed the movement on Warsaw and the Vistula, and had turned the Germans back as far as the frontier, the real campaign of invasion would be conducted through East Prussia.

Feat Thought Impossible. It is likely that they considered it absolutely impossible for the Russians to bring a great combined army with impediments for a winter campaign across Poland in November. This has been done already.

Hence the Germans are now concentrating at high pressure all their available forces from the garrisons of fortresses and the reserves in Silesia, Saxony and Prussia.

(Continued from Page One.) Germans occupied that city, has been returned by the Russians.

Rome reports that the Austrian army is abandoning entirely its positions to Western Galicia and will winter at the foot of the Carpathians, renewing the war from that base in the spring. But the stubborn defense of Przemyśl, the evident determination to defend Cracow hardly confirm the report in Austria.

Dispatches reaching London from Belgium and Holland continue to insist that the Germans are withdrawing many of their troops from the western battle front, but the official communications from the headquarters of the allies do not indicate any diminution in the force of the German attack, which is proceeding with its usual fury.

The food situation in Belgium daily is becoming more critical. Even Antwerp, which is the best supplied of the Belgian cities, is clamoring for the provisions brought into the country by the American commission.

Defeated Candidate Is Deputy Treasurer

Eastman, defeated candidate for the democratic nomination as land commissioner, has been appointed deputy state treasurer by George Hall, treasurer-elect. Mr. Eastman's home is in Custer county. He has been a candidate for land commissioner three or four different times but never succeeded in landing a state house job.

SETTLEMENT IS LIKELY IN INSANITY FEE CASES

LINCOLN, Nov. 11.—(Special.)—Commissioners of Burt, Dakota, Boone, Gage and Stanton counties, the counties in which suit was begun in the supreme court last week for the collection of the insane fees due the state, met with the state auditor today and talked the matter over with him. Neither the commissioners or the auditor would talk for publication, but it is understood that there are grounds to believe that the counties are not anxious for the suit to proceed after discovering that Auditor Howard had few cards up his sleeve which he was prepared to play if necessary.

French Official Statement Reports Capture of Dixmude by Germans

PARIS, Nov. 11.—The French official statement this afternoon says that the fighting was resumed yesterday morning with very great severity between Nieuport and the Lys. The French forces were successful in maintaining their front, but it is admitted that the Germans toward the end of the day succeeded in taking possession of Dixmude. The British troops are described as having repulsed the enemy at several points. At other points on the line the French claim slight progress. The text of the statement follows:

"On our left wing the fighting was resumed yesterday morning between Nieuport and the Lys with a great degree of severity. Generally speaking, our front was maintained in spite of the violence and the strength of the German attacks directed against certain of our points of support.

To the north of Nieuport, we were even able to occupy Lombaerde and advance beyond this town, but toward the end of the day the Germans succeeded in taking possession of Dixmude. We still hold our positions on the approaches to this town, along the canal from Nieuport to Ypres, which has been firmly occupied. The fighting was very hot at these places.

"The British troops attacked also at several points, succeeded everywhere in stopping the enemy.

"On the right of the front the general situation shows no change with the exception of slight progress by our forces to the north of Rosensand, and in the region to the west of Vally, on the right bank of the Alsne. Outside of these points the state of the weather permitted only minor engagements, which resulted successfully for us. Particularly at Coincourt, three kilometers north of the forest of Perroy, we routed a detachment of the enemy."

GEORGE OPENS PARLIAMENT

King Makes Usual Address at Beginning of Session. CALLS FOR MEN AND MONEY

Half Billion Dollars Granted in August Practically All Spent and Half Billion More Will Be Asked.

LONDON, Nov. 11.—King George opened today what probably will prove to be a purely war session of Parliament. No controversial political question will be debated, but this does not mean that the cabinet ministers will be asked some pertinent and uncomfortable questions about their conduct of various phases of the war.

The labor party leaders are especially primed with questions in regard to pay for the soldiers, allowances for their dependents and pensions, but criticism of the government by the opposition probably will be restrained.

Reginald McKenna, the home secretary, is expected to make a report on the situation in regard to alien enemies in England and that the extent of the spy peril needs no additional legislation in this direction.

The most immediate business before the House of Commons will be to provide money for the war in men and money. The recruiting situation may lead to some steps towards compulsory service, and the \$500,000,000 granted in August having been practically spent, a further credit of a like amount probably will be proposed under the special war loan act passed at the last session.

American Foods Reach Belgians

LONDON, Nov. 11.—The relief ship Tolu, chartered by the American commission for relief in Belgium, landed 1,200 tons of food in Rotterdam today. Three thousand tons of foodstuffs have been rushed to Liege, Namur and other remote points, where the distribution already has begun in an effort to relieve the acute want in those districts.

Speech of the King

In his speech from the throne, at the opening of Parliament today, King George said:

"My Lords and Gentlemen: The energies and sympathies of my subjects in every part of the empire are concentrated in the prosecution to a victorious issue of the war in which we are engaged. I have summoned you now in order that, sharing as I am aware you do my conviction that this is a duty of paramount and supreme importance, you should take whatever steps are needed for its adequate discharge.

"Since I last addressed you, the area of the war has been enlarged by the participation in the struggle of the Ottoman empire. In conjunction with my allies and in spite of repeated and continuous provocations, I strove to preserve in regard to Turkey a friendly neutrality. Had counsel and alien influence have driven it into a policy of wanton and defiant aggression and a state of war now exists between us. My Mussulman subjects know well that our rupture with Turkey has been forced upon me against my will, and I recognize with appreciation and gratitude the proofs which they have hastened to give of their loyal devotion and support.

"My navy and army continue throughout the area of conflict to maintain in full measure their glorious traditions. We watch and follow their steadfastness and valor with thankfulness and pride and there is throughout my empire a fixed determination to secure at whatever sacrifice the triumph of our arms and vindication of our cause.

"You will be asked to make due financial provision for the effective conduct of the war, and the only measures which will be submitted to you at this stage of the session are such as seem necessary to my advisers for the attainment of the great purpose upon which the efforts of the empire are set. I confidently commend them to your patriotism and loyalty."
