FIGURES SHOW POOL WINNER

Ninety-Three Counties Give Democrat Majority of 1,111 Over Wait. EACH ONE IS CLAIMING VICTORY

Hoagland Defeated for Lieutenant Governor—Workmen's Compensation Carries by Majority of 4 Over Three Thousand.

Secretary of State Wait has been defeated by Charles Pool, according to revised figures of ninety-three counties, by a majority of 1,111 votes.

The vote of Greeley county, coming in at the last moment, giving Pool 45 lead over Wait, cut into the majority the republican was maintaining.

Mr. Wait at noon today conceded the election of his democratic opponent by 800 at least, with a chance that it may run considerably over the 1,000 mark.
