FIGURES SHOW POOL WINNER

Vinety-Three Counties Give Democrat Majority of 1,111 Over Wait. EACH ONE IS CLAIMING VICTORY

Hongland Defeated for Lieutenant Governor- Workmen's Compensation Carries by Majority of Over Three Thousand.

Secretary of State Wait has been defeated by Charles Pool, according to revised figures of ninety-three counties. by a majority of 1.111 votes.

The vote of Greeley county, coming in at the last moment, giving Pool 475 lead over Walt, cut into the majority the republican was maintaining. Lancaster county's official vote also reduced his lead another 180 votes and a comparison with official returns received at the state house in Lincoln was made with local figures.

Secretary Wait at Lincoln will not cocede his defeat, but insists that official returns will show his election.

Pearson Bents Hongland. In ninety-three countles Pearson has a majority over Hoagland of 1.694, deciding the election of the democratic candidate. Governor Morehead retains his lead and in eighty-one counties he has a plurality

In ninety counties the workmen's compensation proposition has a majority of 4,469 and is undoubtedly carried.

While the official count is not yet made and a few counties have not yet reported to the secretary of state, sufficient is at hand to justify the belief that the offices of governor, treasurer, auditor, secretary of state and lieutenant governor have been gobbled by the democrats, while the republicans will have to be satisfied with state superintendent, land commissioner, railway commissioner and regent of the university.
