## GILMORE SEES PEACE AT HAND

President of Federal League Looks for Settlement of Base Ball War Today.

NEW CUBS TO BE ALL STARS

Team to Be Made Up of Best Players In National and Federal League Teams-Makes Other Statements.

CHICAGO, Nev. 11 .- In an interview here today President James A. Gilmore of the Federal league expressed the opinfon that peace between the outlaw league and Organised base ball was near and that negotiations might be concluded at a conference scheduled for tomorrow in Chicago between Garry Herrmann of the National commission, President B. B. Johnson of the American league and President Charles H. Weeghman of the Chicago Federal league club.

He declared that if the plan under consideration goes through control of the Chicago team will be acquired by Charles H. Weeghman and his business assoctates and that the club will play on the Federal league grounds, which will be enlarged and improved. Gilmore also raid that the new Cubs would be made up of the best players in the present National league team and the Federal league club,



# WESTERN'S LIMIT FIXED AT \$2,800

National Association Practically Settles Big Question in Dispute in the League.

MAGNATES MAY CUT IT DOWN

Meeting Postponed Until Today When Owners Will Take Definite Stand Upon the Proposition Vital to Some Members

The Western league meeting scheduled for yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock was not held. The convention of the national association was not concluded until after 4:30, and the Western league moguls decided that the business was too important for them to miss. Thus the meeting was postponed until this morning at 19

The question of salary limit, which had been occupying the Western leaguers' time for the most part, was practically settled by the National association. It was agreed that the maximum salary limit for the Western should be \$2,800. That means that the players' salaries must come under \$3,800 per year. Onehalf of the manager's salary is to be included in that limit.

The Western league, in session yesterday morning, was talking in favor of a \$3,500 limit. That limit may yet be decided upon by the league, but it is probable that the higher limit will stand.

The Western league will be permitted to carry fifteen men after the season is under way. For twenty days after the opening of the season the Western clubs MARRIED AT SPRINGFIELD will be permitted to carry twenty-five players. SPRINGFIELD, Mass., Nov. 11.-Wal-
