

HUSKERS' PRACTICE SECRET

Coach Stiehm Putting Men Through Preliminaries for Kansas.

EXPECTING A LARGE CROWD

Need Making Preparations to Entertain Many Visitors—Nebraska Eleven is in Splendid Shape.

LINCOLN, Nov. 11.—(Special.)—Coach Stiehm again put his foot wall squad through a long practice last night behind closed doors. Secret practice will be on the bill for all of the week as Stiehm is taking no chances of a "sny" uncovering the new formations which he is preparing for Kansas.

The practice Monday night was devoid of actual scrimmage, but Stiehm put the variety through a long workout last night and sent them against the freshmen in one of the hardest scrimmages of the season. The showing of the regulars was none too encouraging and yet was much better than on Monday night when Potter was out of the lineup.

Potter's return has at least bolstered confidence of the players and the cheering last night was fairly encouraging.

Manager Guy E. Rees is preparing to entertain the largest crowd of foot ball fans that he ever had in Lincoln. The advance reservations are exceeding all expectations and Rees believes that every one of the 11,000 seats in the stadium will be taken. Rees thinks that the crowd will run up close to 12,000, which will break all attendance records by a nice figure.

Stiehm is having the assistance of some of the alumni in turning up the variety for the Jayhawkers. John Westover, Harvey Leonard, Leonard Pardy, and a score of former gridiron heroes will give the Nebraska mentor assistance during the remaining few days before the big game.

Stiehm promises to show the spectators something new in foot ball lines against Kansas. The Nebraska coach has been busy all week working out a series of new plays that are intended to dazzle the crowd and the team is being very proficient in their use.

All of the members of the Cornhusker squad are in excellent shape. Howard has apparently recovered entirely from his bad knee and Potter is also out of the hospital lists so that Nebraska can enter the game next Saturday physically fit for a hard battle.

Bear Dope from Lawrence.

LAWRENCE, Kan., Nov. 11.—(Special.)—Kansas foot ball enthusiasts expect to see the championship title of the Missouri valley resting in Lawrence after next Saturday's game. The Jayhawkers' mentors are not so sure, but are grooming their team for a hard battle. Secret practice has been instituted and an entirely new set of plays is being worked up for the Cornhusker game.

In discussing the coming contest Coach Whelan, the head coach of Kansas university, stated that his team had a fighting chance to win and that was all. He witnessed the Nebraska-Morningstar contest and was greatly impressed with the work of the Cornhuskers.

The Jayhawkers will have their full strength against Stiehm's team next Saturday. James, the big 200-pound guard, who has been out of the game for two weeks, is in prime shape, and Keating, who has been on the hospital list, is again able to take up his work at center.

"Buster" Coolidge, at right end, will be ready for the game in spite of the bolts which are decorating his neck. In the line the two teams are about equal in weight and strength, but in the back field the Kansas acknowledge the superiority of Stiehm's men. The Jayhawkers' back field cannot be compared with Chamberlain, Rutherford, Potter and Doyle. Wood, at quarter, and Gray at halfback are the two mainstays of the Kansas back field and probably will bear the brunt of the work next Saturday at Lincoln.

Captain Dewler, although a hard fighter, has not reached his old-time form on account of the injured leg which he received last season.

More than 50 rosters expect to go to Lincoln for the game, which will be the biggest contest in the valley.

Amendments Are Likely Not to Get Necessary Votes

LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 11.—(Special.)—Receipt of the official vote cast on the constitutional amendments reveals that almost without exception the three propositions are falling behind the vote cast for the head of the ticket. Under the constitutional provision that an amendment to carry must have a majority of votes on the proposition, providing this is a majority of votes cast at the election, the three propositions, even though they secured a heavy vote, will fail.

Taking four counties at random over the state, in no instance goes any amendment have in the affirmative a majority of votes cast on governor. In Butte county the highest amendment received 653 votes, while a majority on governor is 673; in Greeley, the amendment received 570 votes and the majority on governor is 593; in Dawes the figures are 798 and 817; in Nuckolls, 1,482 and 1,498.

Premium lists of the apple show may be obtained of Secretary Duncan at Lincoln and Prof. Chase of the state farm will supply information concerning the corn show.

Prof. Condra will display moving pictures showing the leading industries of the state.

AUSTRIANS LACK BREAD

One Day's Rations Must Do for Three in Army.

SPIES ABOUND IN COUNTRY

Slightest Expression of Doubt as to Authenticity of Official Reports Met with Arrest by the Authorities.

ROME, Nov. 11.—(Special Cablegram to New York World and Omaha Bee.)—Advices received here from Petrograd say that prisoners tell the Russians that the Austrian army for the last month has been getting one day's bread rations every three days and sugarless coffee. The food supply has also failed. The Austrian army still ignores Lemberg's fall. Hungarians, commanding Austrian troops caused an endless muddle owing to their ignorance of the language.

Spies infest the cafes and apartment houses in Vienna, arresting those expressing doubt of the truth of the official reports. The censorship organization in Austria varies according to the district. For instance, Trieste is served with entirely different news than Berlin and Vienna. Where there is no censor, no papers are published.

Poles Are Loyal. A rich Russian is giving abundantly to the homeless of Poland. Moscow papers are filled with columns of praise for Polish loyalty, showing that Germany unintentionally is welding together two hitherto antagonistic peoples. The Garowitch takes intense interest in his own hospital. He lately returned to Petrograd from the front. He spends days there giving the wounded decorations of flowers.

Canrowitch Anxious to Fight. "When I am a man I will go to the front to fight the Germans. Papa says I am too young yet," he says. He holds the patients' hands, and asks convalescents endless questions about the battles.

Princess Tatiana, the czar's second daughter, has given Moscow a splendidly equipped hospital.

MANY DEMOS WANT GRAND ISLAND POSTOFFICE

GRAND ISLAND, Neb., Nov. 11.—(Special.)—It is expected that the campaign for the local postmastership will, with the conclusion of the election, be taken up in the very near future and there is an imposing line of candidates. Among the most frequently mentioned and most active candidates are J. C. Gerspacher, at present county chairman, and J. W. Sink, former representative and well-known in democratic political circles. Others, however, almost as prominently mentioned are J. A. Woolstenholm, former state senator; H. P. Tucker, druggist; C. H. Menck, banker; H. A. Edwards and Elliot Geil of the Free Press, while Emil Vitezak, formerly councilman, is said to be a recent potential entry and there are rumors of promising horses of a dark color. While the incumbency of the present postmaster began April, 1911, the commission is dated February 23, and the latter, with the requested permission of the department, has expressed in a letter to Senator Hitchcock and to Chairman W. H. Thompson of this city his readiness to make the transfer in January at the beginning of the quarter, thus obviating

the necessity of making many extra reports and accommodating his successor, if the same can be appointed and commissioned by that time.
