Fate of Mrs. Russell Now in Jury Hands

The jury is now deliberating upon the case of Mrs. Bernice Russell, who has been on trial in criminal court since Monday on the charge of manslaughter for the slaying of her husband, Charles Russell, a teamster, last August at the Sprague hotel.

An indeterminate sentence of not more than ten years in the penitenliary is pro-vided by law for prisoners convicted of nanslaughter. The case went to the jury after closing arguments by Attorney Harry B. Fleharty for Mrs. Russell and County Attorney Magney for the state. Mrs. Russell took the stand herself Tuesday afternoon, near the end of the introduction of testimony. She asserted that she had been repeatedly abused by Russell, ever since he became her second husband in 1910. She alleged that he had tried to give her poison the day before the shooting, and that he had suggested that she earn money by leading a life of

Describing the shooting, the accused woman declared that she had drawn a revolver from her waist, when Russell struck her and knocked her down. The insisted that he had hold of the revolver with her, when it was fired, and that she was acting in self-defense. She said she is il years of age, and has two grown daughters, who were in court and testified in support of their mother's story
