

### GRAIN MEN TO RETAIN RATE

Omaha Dealers to Maintain Interest on Advances at Six Per Cent.

### SITUATION IS NOT PERMANENT

President Hynes of Local Exchange Believes the Higher Charges for Money Are Only Temporary.

Omaha grain commission men, who are now paying 7 per cent on advances on which they are charging customers only 6 per cent, have decided that no increase shall be made unless the increased cost of money gives indication of being permanent.

"We have discussed the situation and the board of directors, has decided to hold off any increase in the future which we believe has been caused by the war is permanent. It is possible that the rates may then be increased. The rates of interest are fixed at 6 per cent, have always been 6 per cent and unless the situation becomes more stringent there will be no increased charges."

### Fate of Mrs. Russell Now in Jury Hands

The jury is now deliberating upon the case of Mrs. Bernice Russell, who has been on trial in criminal court since Monday on the charge of manslaughter for the slaying of her husband, Charles Russell, a teamster, last August at the Sprague hotel.

An indeterminate sentence of not more than ten years in the penitentiary is provided by law for prisoners convicted of manslaughter. The case went to the jury after closing arguments by Attorney Harry B. Fleharty for Mrs. Russell and County Attorney Magney for the state.

Mrs. Russell took the stand herself Tuesday afternoon, near the end of the introduction of testimony. She asserted that she had been repeatedly abused by Russell, ever since he became her second husband in 1910.

### ANDERSON GETS CLEAN BILL

Commissioners Acquit Policeman of Charge of Beating Prisoner.

### KUGEL AND MCGOVERN VOTE NO

Several Witnesses Testify to Seeing the Man Beaten Until Blood Runs on the Police Station Floor.

Police Officer A. C. Anderson, charged with beating a handcuffed prisoner, after the man had been dragged to the station, was cleared of the charges by the city commission on a four to two vote.

Witnesses were produced by the police department to show that Anderson had wantonly struck the prisoner, Frank Robb, a floater, when he was in a drunk and comatose condition. Three police reporters for the daily papers—B. H. Berkovich of The Bee, Nell R. Murray of the News and Ned Aitchison of the World-Herald—said they witnessed the beating.

Witnesses testified that the floor of the police station was smeared with Robb's blood following the beating. Anderson gave him. City Purchasing Agent Dick Grote, testified that he saw Anderson swing an uppercut at the handcuffed man and that the prisoner left a trail of blood behind him.

Ryder Moves Dismissal. Former Police Commissioner J. J. Ryder moved Anderson's dismissal. He declared the evidence was insufficient to "blacken the policeman's record."

"The man is a desperate character. A policeman and a citizen were holding him and he was about to break away from them. I merely slapped him. He was fighting drunk. He is a husky fellow and with a fighting jag on was hard to handle."

Policeman Tom O'Connor testified in Anderson's behalf. O'Connor first arrested Robb. The prisoner was produced and showed no signs of a beating, although the arrest was made two weeks ago.

"It's not a question of whether the prisoner was beaten up, but whether we want to countenance the action of an officer who strikes a handcuffed man," Robb is a young fellow of slight build. He has promised to leave town "at the earliest convenience." He is out of work. He said he knew nothing about the affair until he woke up in the attic with bleeding face and bruised head.
