Hitchcock Says Was Good Victory

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Nov. 12.—(Special.)—The democratic victory in Nebraska is looked upon by Senator Gilbert M. Hitchcock as an endorsement of President Wilson, while the big democratic loss in the lower house of congress is also given by the senator as an indication that the people endorse the policies of the president.

Senator Hitchcock was in Lincoln today and called at the state house to pay his respects to Governor Morehead and to congratulate him upon his re-election. The senator believes the reduction in the big democratic majority in the house of representatives to be due entirely to the effects of the war in Europe, and that the democratic administration was not responsible for the loss in congressmen.

ORGANIZED AGRICULTURAL SOCIETIES TO HAVE BANQUET

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Nov. 12.—(Special.)—The banquet to be given by the twenty-five societies composing Organized Agriculture will be a distinct feature next January. The representatives of the various societies voted to combine their efforts in the banquet line and unite in one demonstration in the interests of agricultural, horticultural, live stock and dairy production.

R. W. McGinnis of Lincoln is the chairman of the banquet committee and will plan the event. Leading agricultural, fruit, dairy and live stock experts from all parts of the country will be present and will attend the meetings of Organized Agriculture January 15 to 23.

Notes from Broken Bow

BROKEN BOW, Neb., Nov. 12.—(Special.)—Judge Hostetter is sitting in district court this week. The term is a jury one, but there are few criminal cases on the docket. The case of Frank Jacquot against the Burlington railroad in which the plaintiff asks damages for the burning of a grain elevator at Anselmo some time ago, occupied two days of the week. After the evidence was in, Judge Hostetter took over the case and instructed the jury to find for the defendant.

The city council has decided to give the young people plenty of recreation the winter and ordered that portion of the North Side park be flooded when cold weather sets in so as to form a large skating rink. Electricians have lately been plying in the park so there will be plenty of illumination. The city will conduct the rink at its own expense.

A proposition has been submitted by the electric light people that if the council will give them the contract of pumping the city water for the balance of their franchise they will put in a \$10,000 municipal sewer system. The matter is being considered.

MCCOOK, Neb., Nov. 12.—(Special.)—Ira L. Clark of Freedom, Neb., and Mrs. Lena Gover of Boulder, Colo., were married here today by County Judge P. M. Coffey.

The Burlington company has a force of men here employed in disinfecting its stock cars on this division as a precaution against the foot and mouth disease prevailing in the east, and stock diseases found to prevail in limited parts of northwestern Nebraska.

Notes from Gage County. HEATRICE, Neb., Nov. 12.—(Special.)—Mrs. Olive Tilton, wife of A. C. Tilton, a prominent farmer of the Filley vicinity, died suddenly at her home Wednesday afternoon. She was born in Gage county, Illinois, August 12, 1857, and had lived in Gage county since 1878. She is survived by her husband and seven children.

The claim of John Hurst against the estate of his father, the late Peter Hurst of Barneston, was disallowed by Judge Fomerton in the district court Wednesday. The case had been appealed from the county court and may go to the supreme court. Peter Hurst left an estate valued at \$4,000 to six of his children, and claims amounting to nearly that sum were filed against the estate some time ago which were disallowed by the county court.

Nebraska EXPENSE LISTS ARE FILED

Candidates on State Tickets Reveal What Campaign Cost. MORE DEPUTYSHIPS TO GIVE OUT. Report Gains Currency that Defeated Democrats Are to Be Given Place by the More Successful Ones.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Nov. 12.—(Special.)—Candidates for office are beginning to make their statements of expenses for election purposes, the following being filed today: Thomas L. Kall (rep.), railway commissioner, \$414.50; O. S. Spillman (rep.), congress, \$36.29; W. M. Maupin (dem.), railway commissioner, \$10.00; Dan Stephens (dem.), congress, Third district, \$63.54; A. O. Thomas (rep.), state superintendent, \$53.91; C. F. Heavis (rep.), congress, First district, \$51.70; S. R. Barton (rep.), congress, Fifth district, \$25.00; A. H. Birelow, treasurer, progressive congressional committee, Second district, received \$20 and spent \$20.

Others May Get Look In. The early appointment of George Hall, treasurer-elect, that he had tendered the deputyship in his office to Mr. Eastham, defeated candidate for land commissioner, gives rise to the rumor that all three democratic candidates on the state ticket who failed to land will be taken care of. These are Will M. Maupin, who was a candidate for railway commissioner, and P. M. Whitehead, defeated candidate for state superintendent.

Mr. Maupin was labor commissioner under Governor Shallenberger and is quoted as saying that he would accept the same position again and the only one he would care to monkey with. Just what position would go to Mr. Whitehead is not known. Mr. Whitehead is now superintendent of the city schools at Gothenburg, drawing a salary of \$1,400 a year. A deputyship pays \$1,800 a year and there are just three left, attorney general, auditor and secretary of state.

Candidates for the speakership are still getting into the race, the last being Fred Hoffmeister of Chase county. Mr. Hoffmeister was one of the few really good presiding officers during the last session of the house and feels that he stands a show.

QUEER QUIRKS IN CASS ELECTION EXPENSES

WERPINO WATER, Neb., Nov. 12.—(Special.)—Some interesting figures are showing up in the expense accounts which are being filed with the county clerk of this county by the various men who ran for office in the county at the recent election. The highest amount shown by the reports that are in so far as 1914 reported by William Phipps of Werpino, defeated democratic candidate for representative from the Eighth district. The lowest amount is \$5 reported by H. L. Clements of Elwood, defeated republican candidate for county coroner. One of the most interesting comparisons in the items listed by the various candidates is the showing of \$2 spent for postage by one candidate and 12 cents spent for the same purpose by another candidate. Perhaps the most curious thing shown by the records is the fact that the socialist candidate for county commissioner, H. D. Stine, of Union, did what might be counted quite anti-socialistic—paid the high price of over 4 cents apiece for the votes he secured. His reports an expense of \$15, and the records show that he received but 507 votes.


