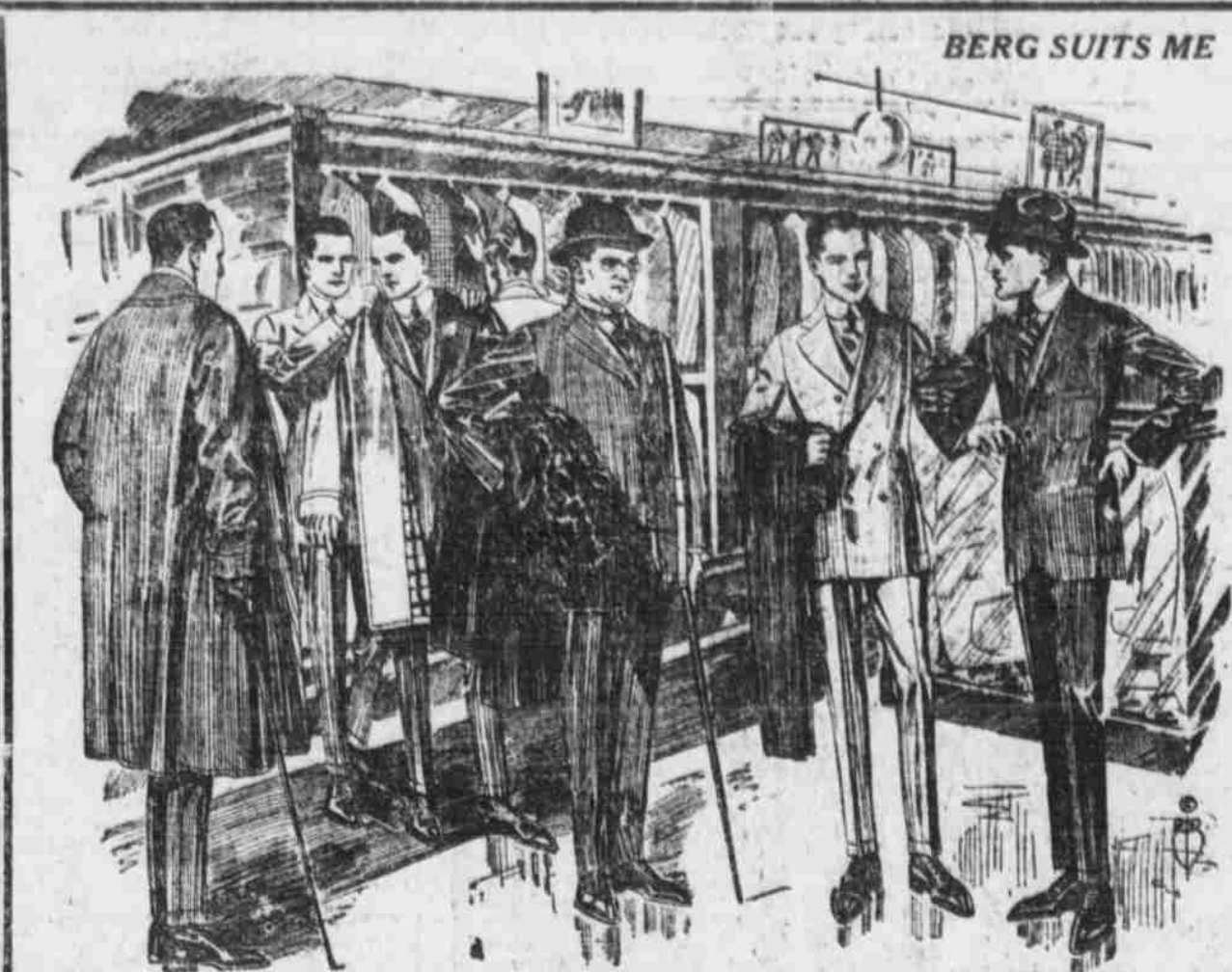


From Our Near Neighbors
