GERMANY NOT BOUND BY HAGUE TREATY ON MINES

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11 .- State department records support the assertion that Germany is not legally bound by the pro visions of The Hague treaty limiting the use of submarine mines.

Article seven of the treaty provides that it shall not be operative unless all of the belligerents have ratified the treaty. The department's records show that Russia, Turkey and Servia of the belligerent countries have not ratified the convention. Under that construction the observance of the provision by any of the belligerents is only a voluntary one.




