GAME FOR THANKSGIVING DAY NO GAME WITH HARVARD

Lane Technical School of Chicago to Meet Omaha High.

GREAT GAME IS EXPECTED

Event is to Be Made Something of a Home Coming of Many of the Former Omaha Boys.

Word has been received that Lane Technical school of Chicago has been allowed to reorganize its foot ball team and will be able to come to Omaha for the Thanksgiving day game. Lane Tech has had Englewood for the championship of Chicago and has beaten Oak Park and Wendell Phillips.

Two years ago Omaha High met Lane Tech at Omaha on Thanksgiving day and won, 23 to 6. The average weight of the Lane Tech men is 150 pounds, and Omaha averages practically the same. Lane Tech has met defeat three times this year and has won six games. One of their defeats was in the game with Clinton, Ia. At that time the team was in bad condition from loss of sleep and loss of five of their best men.

The Omaha game will be the first of the first annual homecoming of the alumni of the Omaha High school. Boxes will be arranged for the different classes.

Manager Richards Wires It Will Be Impossible to Accept.

CHICAGO ALREADY REFUSED

Little Chance Illinois Will Consent to Meet Cornhuskers—Scrimmage for Iowa Game in Fall Swing.

LINCOLN, Nov. 18.—(Special Telegram.)—Harvard will not accept Nebraska's challenge for a post-season game. A newspaper dispatch from Manager T. K. Richardson of Harvard dashes the hopes of Cornhusker fans for a championship battle with the eastern leaders. The dispatch follows:

"All hopes for a post-season game between the University of Nebraska and Harvard vanished today when T. K. Richardson of the Harvard Athletic association declared the game against Yale at New Haven next Saturday would be positively the last the Crimson would play this year. Harvard cannot see its way clear to accept Nebraska's challenge," said Richardson.

No Post Season Games. "The game against Yale will close the season here. We were forced to reject an invitation from the president of the University of Chicago to play the winner of the western conference for the championship of the United States.

Perhaps next year things may be so arranged as to make post-season games between the eastern and western teams not only possible, but desirable. But this year, so far as Harvard is concerned, it is out of the question."

Although disappointed, Nebraska's next turn will probably be to challenge Illinois for the western championship. And there is little chance Illinois wants any of Nebraska's games. Dispatches from Urbana also indicate that the big eight conference champions are duking.

Total Receipts Heavy.

Manager Guy E. Reed this afternoon announced that the total receipts from the Nebraska game were approximately \$10,000. With expenses of officials deducted, Nebraska will receive about \$4,500 for her share and a like amount will go to Kansas. Reed had a splendid letter from Manager Hamilton of Kansas today in which he states that Coach Wheaton has written to Walter Camp concerning the work of the Nebraska team, especially Rutherford, Chamberlain and Halligan.

Coach Blinn gave the Huskers the first hard practice for the Iowa game tonight. He kept the varsity in scrimmage until nearly dark before he called a halt. The regulars also spent a little time working out some new formations for Iowa. The team leaves here tomorrow afternoon for Iowa City. Classes will be dismissed to allow the students to escort the players to the depot.

Taft Says Break in Weeghman's Negotiations for Cub Stock.

FED MAG CRIES WAR TO KNIFE

MURPHY STILL HAS SAY AND HE STANDS IN WAY OF DEAL—ROGER BRENSHAN TO MANAGE CHICAGO NATIONALS.

CHICAGO, Nov. 18.—Developments affecting the Chicago National league club—and through it the state of the baseball war existing between the Federal league and the parties to the National agreement, came fast yesterday. First was the revelation that Charles W. Murphy, despite his having been "ousted" last winter, still has a large influence among those directing the club's affairs; then came Charles P. Taft's declaration of a break in Charles Weeghman's negotiations for the purchase of the Taft interests in the club, and third was the definite announcement that Roger Brenschan would be manager of the Cubs in 1915.

No Chance for Weeghman. Murphy's influence became apparent in the success of his fight to keep the Cubs on their West Side playing ground, of which he is a half owner, with Mr. Taft holding the other half. On returning from Cincinnati Murphy declared there was no chance for Weeghman's buying into the National league club, and this was confirmed soon after by Taft's announcement that negotiations were ended. Finally Murphy stated positively that Brenschan would succeed Hank O'Day as West Side pilot. Partial confirmation of this came later when President Thomas was requested by Taft, over long distance telephone, to bring Brenschan to Cincinnati, there to attend tomorrow a special meeting of the Cub directors and discuss terms under which he would take over the management.

War to Finish.

"If Mr. Taft has called off negotiations between himself and me regarding the purchase of the Cubs stock, it means war to a finish between the Federal league and organized ball," said Weeghman, president of the Chicago Federals. "The Federa! league was anxious for peace, but if we can't have it, we are more ready for war than ever."

All Is Off.

CINCINNATI, Nov. 18.—All negotiations between Charles Weeghman, president of the Chicago Federal league club, and Charles P. Taft, majority owner of the Chicago National league club, for the purchase of the latter's stock, were broken off abruptly by the latter today. In answer to a telegram from Weeghman, asking for an extension until December 1 of an option on Taft's stock in the Chicago Nationals, Weeghman was sent a letter not only refusing to extend the time, but informing him that all negotiations looking toward his prospective purchase of the Chicago Nationals were at an end.

When asked what effect the failure of Mr. Weeghman to purchase the Chicago Nationals would have on the proposed peace negotiations, Chairman August Herrmann of the national commission said: "I cannot tell as yet. I have no idea at this time."

Federals Meet Cleveland Men.

Whether Cleveland will have a Federal league ball club next year was discussed at a two-hour conference here today by President Gilmore of the Federal league and G. B. Ward and W. E. Robertson of the Brooklyn and Buffalo Federal league clubs, together with local men interested in the project. At the conclusion of the conference the conferees made an inspection of the site for a ball park on which local Federal league enthusiasts have taken an option.

Wendall Back and May Teach Swimming

G. P. Wendall, formerly swimming instructor at the Carter Lake club, has returned from Chicago, where he has been head swimming instructor at the Central Young Men's Christian association.

Upon Wendall's departure from Chicago more than 25 of his pupils and associates tendered him a spirited appreciation of his services in their behalf during his stay there. The certificate contains the signatures of H. V. Western, chairman of the swimming committee of the Amateur Athletic federation; Fred J. McConnell, captain of the Chicago water polo team which won the championship of the world; Harold Christensen, all-around swimming champion of the Amateur Athletic federation; Karl Bauer, champion of St. Louis in 1913 and 1914, and Dr. H. B. Clepp, water poloist of Chicago.

During his term in Chicago, Wendall conducted several aquatic societies. He organized a class in life-saving which earned him considerable publicity, and his team won the Inter-Y meet. The local Young Men's Christian association and Wendall are negotiating for Wendall to devote two or three nights a week to teaching Omaha to swim. In Chicago Wendall was recognized as one of the best swimming instructors in the business.

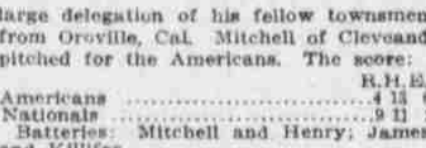
Creighton Foot Ball Men Theater Guests
