## VISITING NURSES DOING GOOD WORK

Report of Superintendent Shows Many Cases Being Cared For by the Association.

### TO HANDLE CHILDREN'S GIFTS

Receiving Station is Established at the Building Formerly Occupied by the Independent Telephone Company.

Superintendent Beasts Randall of the Visiting Nurse association, reporting at the monthly meeting of the organization, summed up the work that had been done during the month of November. She said: "We made a record in the metropolitan work, calling on forty-two patients 211 times, which netted up \$1112.

"The other work has increased proportionately. Mrs. Wheeler in district No. 1 cared for fifty-six patients, most of them being new; 25 calls were made in this district, 16 of them being metropolitan.

"This is the largest number of calls we have ever made in one district. "The doctors tell us that this has been an unusually fruitful fall, yet we have a surprising number of acute cases, which have called for daily visits. We have also had many accident cases.

"Miss Sweeney in district No. 2 cared for fifty-eight patients. To them 286 visits were made. Miss Eggeston made 210 visits to fifty-five patients. Miss Elzasser assists the nurse who needs her most.

"In making a summary we find that 821 calls have been made to 169 patients. An unusual demand has been made upon our tuberculosis cases.

"We are busy with the Thanksgiving offering to be received from the school children. This year the receiving station will be on the first floor of the Independent Telephone building, the offerings to be divided among the endorsed charities, each receiving what he most needed.

"Since Miss Johnson, field supervisor of the Metropolitan Life Insurance company, visited here we have received requests for literature from three visiting nurses' association. In each request it was stated that our work had been cited by Miss Johnson as of some of the best in the middle west.

"Each week we see where our work can be improved, and it is a view of this broader field that encourages us to go on."

## Dr. Stimson to Give Instructive Talk on Omaha Park Needs

A campaign of education for the purpose of creating sentiment favorable to bigger appropriations for parks and playgrounds will begin Friday night when Dr. Cyrus F. Stimson, field secretary of the Playground and Recreation Association of America, will make the first of a series of "instructive" addresses. He will speak to the Monmouth Park Improvement club. Later Mr. Stimson will address the various women's clubs of the city; also Secretary E. E. Clouson of the Federated Improvement clubs will call a meeting of the clubs to hear Mr. Stimson.

"A good work is being done by Park Commissioner J. B. Hummel with the funds available," said Dr. Stimson, "but the people must be taught to know that a big work and a necessary work like this cannot be carried on without money. Money is the prime necessity for success."

Commissioner Hummel is lending Dr. Stimson assistance in his survey of the park and playground facilities in Omaha. He was employed by the Board of Education, the city council and Dr. Harold Gifford to spend two weeks or more studying the situation here, to then report plans for a more comprehensive system of recreation centers.

### KENNEDY GIVES ANOTHER FIVE HUNDRED TO SUFFRAGE

A total of \$1,675.50 was contributed to the Douglas county democratic central committee during the recent political campaign according to the statement of its treasurer, John Killian, under the corrupt practices act.

Included were contributions of \$100 by Mayor Dahman; \$150 by Charles E. Fanning; \$15 by L. J. Quinby, H. C. Richmond \$25 and County Attorney Magney \$50. Among the expenses were items of \$121.50 for banners, \$91 for music and \$19 for horns and flags.

John L. Kennedy has filed a statement in which he admits that he has contributed another \$50 to the cause of suffrage.

## Uncle "Joe" Redman Has Cure for Hoof and Mouth Disease
