GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET

Exporters Slow to Report Volume of Business, Said to Be Large. ALL GRAINS MAKE ADVANCES. Wheat up One to One and Half Cents. Corn One-Half to One and Oats One-Half—Country Shipments Fall Off.

OMAHA, Nov. 19, 1914. One of the big grain men of the Duluth market who was on the board of Trade yesterday on his way to the east reported the stocks of wheat at Duluth port well cleaned up. It was said that reports from wheat exporters in other countries by Duluth houses yesterday and that considerable wheat was being sent to the east. It was also reported that the stocks of grain at Duluth had been taken up just before the close of the season and it is to be shipped all rail to the seaboard.

Exporters here, as well as elsewhere, were slow to report business in western wheat but it was said to be very large, yet only 200,000 bu. were made public. It was said that the stocks of wheat in our own northwest are much smaller than those elsewhere.

The best indicator of the winter wheat yield yesterday said that the movement of wheat will show a further falling off, as the harvest season is now well on to a much higher level.

Wheat news from abroad was mainly helpful to the way to the east. From Buenos Aires it is reported that 1,500,000 acres of the finest agricultural portion of France is available for planting.

Montreal reported vessel chartered there for 55,000 bu. of wheat to go to the west. It is expected that the boats for November or December loading out of Montreal continue quite strong and are being loaded in large quantities.

The wheat spot in the corn market was early on increased offerings. With an increase in the quantity of wheat it is likely to become more active. Liverpool was 3d higher for futures, while Chicago was 1/2 cent lower.

Oats closed stronger, because country shipments are increasing. Receipts of oats at the leading western markets were 11,500 bushels, compared with 11,500 a week ago and 13,400 a year ago.

Clearances were: Wheat and flour, 50,000 bu.; corn, 3,000 bu.; oats, 10,000 bu.

Primary wheat receipts were 2,000,000 bu. and shipments 1,750,000 bu. Receipts of 1,850,000 bu. and shipments of 1,150,000 bu. last year.

KELLY TRIAL BEGINS AGAIN

Mrs. Edmund Sterring Takes Witness Stand Against Doctor. CONVICTS BACK AFTER ESCAPE. Frank Johnson Given Five Years Additional for Making Getaway. While Employed in Convict Camp.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) DES MOINES, Ia., Nov. 18.—(Special Telegram.)—Mrs. Edmund Sterring (whose husband was killed by Dr. Harry Kelly nearly three years ago, gave testimony in court in the Kelly trial today. She was brought to court in an automobile in charge of a doctor, who testified her husband was only temporarily in the asylum and had been employed in other occupations. The state quickly finished its case and the defense commenced by reading depositions of some witnesses at the former trial.

Five Years More. Frank Johnson, the convict who escaped last summer from the road camp at Ames, was sentenced to five years in the penitentiary in addition to the sentence he is serving.

George Becker, the convict who escaped from the Ames camp a few days ago, has been captured in Greeley, Colo. He will be returned to the state and will be arraigned in court for his arrest, having five years added to his present sentence.

Conductor Killed in Fight with Train Robber in Iowa. EAGLE GROVE, Ia., Nov. 18.—William J. Reynolds, a freight conductor of the Chicago & Northwestern railroad, was killed early today in a battle with a train robber between Bradgate and Rutland. The bandit escaped into the woods in Humboldt county, where the officers have organized a posse and are searching the country for him.

Shortly after the Northwestern freight train left Bradgate, a masked man entered the caboose, where H. H. Dale, the brakeman, and Tom Crane of Sioux Rapids, a stockman, were riding. Reynolds was standing on the back platform. The bandit opened up with a shot at Crane's feet and commanded both men to lie up against the wall and hold up their hands. They complied. Reynolds, hearing the commotion inside, rushed in and grappled with the bandit. Reynolds wrestled with him and pushed him toward the caboose door. Once on the platform the bandit succeeded in getting one arm free and fired three shots, one of which struck Reynolds. Then both men rolled off the rear platform on the track which was still moving.

Dale immediately gave the signal for the train to stop, and when it stopped, he was found lying on the track. The train then proceeded to Rutland with Reynolds. The alarm was given at Rutland and the search began.

No money was secured from either Dale or Crane, as Reynolds engaged the bandit before he had begun his search.

Four Carloads of Corn for Belgians. PORT DODGE, Ia., Nov. 18.—(Special.)—If donations of corn and cash continue as they have for the last week, Webster county will contribute 5,000 bushels, or nearly four cars, of corn to the needy Belgians. The town of Dayton has pledged itself to give one carload, or about 1,500 bushels, of corn. L. W. Wheeler of this city, who is in charge of the work, declares that the response to the appeal has been wonderful. One woman living in the southern part of the county herself gathered four bushels of the best corn on her farm and delivered it to the elevator in a nearby town.

TUBERCULOSIS CONFERENCE MEETS IN SHENANDOAH. SHENANDOAH, Ia., Nov. 17.—(Special.)—Every phase of the prevention and the cure of tuberculosis will be taken up at the Southwestern Iowa Inter-County conference on tuberculosis of Page, Fremont, Montgomery and Mills counties that will be held in the public library here beginning Friday afternoon. This is the initial effort of the state board to create a sentiment among laymen as well as physicians to stamp out the disease by arousing interest in the work through gatherings of this sort. If it proves a success others will be held in the state. Doctors from the neighboring towns, as well as state men from the department at Des Moines, school teachers, housekeepers, editors and professional men will take part of the two days' session. A. E. Keppert of Des Moines, state lecturer, will be the director.

Prof. Scheve Home from Berlin. GRINNELL, Ia., Nov. 18.—(Special.)—Prof. and Mrs. Edward B. Scheve of the Grinnell College of Music have arrived here after having been delayed in Germany since the beginning of the war. Mrs. Scheve has been in circulation concerning the reasons for the continuing absence of Mr. and Mrs. Scheve, some of them even being to the effect that since Mr. Scheve was born in Germany he was in danger of being drafted into the service of the Kaiser. Prof. Scheve merely laughed when he learned of this and said "No, I became an American citizen long ago, and besides, I am too old for a soldier. The reason is very simple; Mrs. Scheve and I could not secure passage, so we waited in Berlin."

More Cases of Diphtheria. SHENANDOAH, Ia., Nov. 18.—(Special.)—Two more cases have developed of diphtheria in Shenandoah. Mrs. C. J. Carlson, who has been taking care of two of her children, has been advised by a doctor and another one of her children has the disease in a mild form. The school children that were sent home Monday will be allowed to return to school by Thursday if they show no signs of the disease. A large per cent of the school children suffering from any form of throat trouble were dismissed from the schools. The schools will be examined again Monday in an effort to keep the disease in check.

CHICAGO STOCK EXCHANGE WILL REOPEN MONDAY. CHICAGO, Nov. 18.—The Chicago Stock exchange will resume business Monday morning. Trading will be permitted in all listed and unlisted stocks at the closing prices of July 31. The same rule applies to bonds in hands of clearing banks and stock traders will be permitted to deduct one dividend.
