NO LIMIT TO WHEAT DEMAND Take Salts To

More Than Million Bushels Daily Exported by United States.

TOTAL SINCE JULY 142,000,000

Primary Receipts Since July 261,750,000-Visible Supply Thirteen Millions More Than Year Ago.

"One million bushels of wheat was worked for export at Kansas City Monday, Liverpool being 4c higher. There seems to be no limit to the export demand for American wheat," says Alies Logan of Kansas City in a statement to President W. J. Hynes of the Omaha Grain exchange. "It may interest you to know that since July 1 of this year boo bushels of wheat. That is the export for 139 days, or a little more than 1,000,000 ishels a day. It means approximately \$75,000,000 bushels a year, which exceeds the amount we have for export."

"This shows the tremendous merchandising in wheat at this time," says Mr. Hynes, "and is a matter of the most acute interest among all grain and other usiness men who keep tab on such

Mr Logan is the man who first prodicted that Kansas this year would pronotwithstanding contrary forecasts by the government and other experts. Kansas produced, it will be recalled, about 182,000,000 bushels of wheat. Mr. Logan is said to be as keen an observer and thorough a statistician as there is in the

"Wheat in Kansas has not gone into the ground in nearly as good condition,' says he, "as a year ago, and rains are badly needed over a large area in the western part of the state."

Some Remarkable Figures. Then he gives some comparative figures

of interest as follows:

Primary wheat receipts since July 1 to date have reached the enormous total of 261,756,000 bushels, against only 159,671,000 up to this time last year. In other words, the primary movement to date is \$1,000,000 bushels greater than a year ago and our visible supply of wheat only 12,500,000 greater than a year ago. The visible supply of wheat of the United States and Canada is only 93,546,000, against \$1,104,000 a year ago, the Canadian visible being 1,150,000 less than a year ago, Kanass City wheat receipts since July 1 to date were 49,000,000 bushels, against only 31,750,000 a year ago, and Chicago has several millions less wheat in store than a year ago. St. Louis receipts of about 20,000,000 bushels ince July 1 are \$,000,000 greater than last year.

Last week the United States and Can-ada supplied all the wheat shipped to the consuming countries of Europe ex-cepting 740,000 bushels, Europe is abso-lutely dependent upon this country for its supplies and there is no getting away from it.


