

NO LIMIT TO WHEAT DEMAND

More Than Million Bushels Daily Exported by United States.

TOTAL SINCE JULY 148,000,000

Primary Receipts Since July 1 261,750,000—Visible Supply Thirteen Millions More Than Year Ago.

"One million bushels of wheat was worked for export at Kansas City Monday, Liverpool being higher. There seems to be no limit to the export demand for American wheat," says Aileen Logan of Kansas City in a statement to President W. J. Hynes of the Omaha Grain exchange. "It may interest you to know that since July 1 of this year the United States has exported 142,000,000 bushels of wheat. That is the export for 135 days, or a little more than 1,000,000 bushels a day. It means approximately 75,000,000 bushels a year, which exceeds the amount we have exported."

"This shows the tremendous merchandising in wheat at this time," says Mr. Hynes, "and is a matter of the most acute interest among all grain and other business men who keep tab on such things."

Mr. Logan is the man who first predicted that Kansas this year would produce a wheat crop of 180,000,000 bushels, notwithstanding contrary forecasts by the government and other experts. Kansas produced, it will be recalled, about 120,000,000 bushels of wheat. Mr. Logan is said to be as keen an observer and thorough a statistician as there is in the west.

"Wheat in Kansas has not gone into the ground in nearly as good condition," says he, "as a year ago, and rains are badly needed over a large area in the western part of the state."

Some Remarkable Figures.

Then he gives some comparative figures of interest as follows: Primary receipts since July 1 to date have reached the enormous total of 261,750,000 bushels, against only 150,071,000 up to this time last year. In other words, the primary receipts of wheat are 111,679,000 bushels greater than a year ago and our visible supply of wheat only 13,500,000 bushels less than a year ago. The visible supply of wheat of the United States and Canada is only 3,546,000, against 3,104,000 a year ago. The visible supply of wheat is 1,150,000 less than a year ago. Kansas City wheat receipts since July 1 to date were 46,000 bushels, against only 15,000 a year ago, and Chicago has several million less wheat in store than a year ago. St. Louis receipts of about 200,000 bushels since July 1 are 6,000,000 greater than last year.

Last week the United States and Canada supplied all the wheat shipped to the consuming countries of Europe excepting 740,000 bushels. Europe is absolutely dependent upon this country for its supplies and there is no getting away from it.

Hunter Withdraw from Race to Help Election of Avery

Superintendent E. U. Graff of the public schools has received a letter from Superintendent Fred M. Hunter of Lincoln, giving his reasons for withdrawing from the race for president of the Nebraska State Teachers' association. The letter in part says: "I feel very sure that Chancellor Avery will accept the nomination and presidency, provided his election can be accomplished by common consent. In my opinion, no happier method of uniting the various contending interests of the association can be found than by unanimously choosing the head of our great state university as the leader of the association for the coming year. I feel very sure that our own teachers and those under your own supervision in Omaha, as well as those from the various towns of the state, would feel that the very best educational interest of the state had been conserved were Chancellor Avery to be made the head of the state organization. Under no circumstances, therefore, could I allow my name to be used."

Since the writing of the letter Chancellor Avery withdrew from the race, as did all the other candidates except Superintendent E. J. Barr of Grand Island. The ballots are being printed and will be mailed to the teachers Friday. Superintendent Barr, who will be the next president of the association, has been in the position he now holds at Grand Island for thirty-three years.

Wellesley Girls to Help Raise the Fire Fund in Omaha

Moving pictures of college activities at Wellesley college are to be exhibited in Omaha at the Monroe theater, Twenty-sixth and Farnam streets, December 3, both matinee and evening, as a fire benefit. To help raise a fund to rebuild what the recent fire destroyed at Wellesley. There is a proposition to raise \$5,000.00, partly as an endowment and partly as a fund to repair the fire damage. Rockefeller has given toward this on condition that the rest be raised. It remains for enthusiastic alumni all over the country to raise some \$300,000. The Wellesley club of Omaha has jumped into the field and has engaged this theater, at which the films will be shown. The celebrated Tree Day pageant of Wellesley will be shown in moving pictures. The various crew races and other athletic events will be shown. A Greek play, "Medea," given by the students last year, will be reproduced in pictures.

LIKES NEW WORKMEN LAW

George Wrightman Says it is Grand Success in Iowa.

TO ADDRESS MANUFACTURERS Tells of Organization of Mutual Insurance Companies, Which Lessen Cost of Insurance to Iowa Concerns.

"Nebraska now has a good workmen's compensation law, and you will be better off with it than before," said George Wrightman of Des Moines, secretary of the Iowa State Manufacturers' association, when he arrived in Omaha to attend the sessions of the Nebraska Manufacturers' association. "We have a compensation law in Iowa, and it works out splendidly. It has been in effect since July. We have a mutual insurance company of manufacturers to cover the losses incurred by individual manufacturers through the operation of the law. It is the only way. Of course, I know the insurance men don't like the mutual idea, and you can't blame them, for they want this insurance business of the manufacturers. But can anything be more simple and efficient than that all the manufacturers club together and make up a pool from which compensation is paid to anyone hurt in any one of these factories? Isn't that simple?"

"The insurance men tried to tell us that was a hard thing to do; that it was next to impossible. But we are organized into a mutual insurance company, under the laws of the state; we have a fund of \$100,000 in the bank, and the losses from injuries in the first four months the law has been in operation were but \$3,500. We don't need all the money we have provided for the fund, and our rate of premium is much lower than it would be if each were insured in a liability company."

Heavy Wind Storm Sweeps Across Iowa

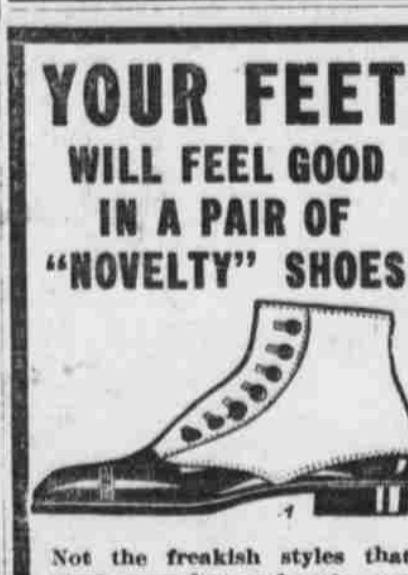
