Negroes Plan Charity Ball—A charity ball will be given by the colored folks of Omaha this evening at Washington hall, Eighteenth and Harney streets, for the benefit of the old People's home of the African race. Reserved seats in the gallery will be sold to spectators.

Will Talk on Parks—Dr. Cyrus F. Stinson of New York City and Park Commissioner, J. B. Hummel will address the Monmouth Park Social center Friday evening at Monmouth Park school on the need of parks and playgrounds in Omaha. The meeting will begin at 8 o'clock.

Dr. Dodge Buys in Kountze Place—Dr. Roy A. Dodge purchased from Hastings & Heyden an \$8,000 home in Kountze place, located at the northwest corner of Nineteenth and Spencer streets, where he will make his future home. This property was formerly owned by E. T. Heyden.

Roller Skating Saturday—The roller skating season will open at the Omaha Auditorium Saturday night. Indications throughout the east are that roller skating is coming into favor again very rapidly and the big rinks are receiving very heavy patronage. The Auditorium floor has all been resurfaced and put in fine condition for this healthful indoor sport. There will be skating every Saturday night, Sunday afternoon and Sunday night. Good order and correct deportment will be maintained, as usual, so that all who attend will be assured of a good time.

Austrians Defeat Servians and Take Prisoners and Guns

BERLIN, Nov. 18.—(Via The Hague and London, Nov. 18.)—The Neu Freie Presse correspondent gives details of the capture of Valjevo, Serbia. The Austrians advanced in five columns, three of which arrived within cannon range early Sunday. The attack was delayed because of the slow progress of the other columns over a different terrain. The attack began at 10 o'clock. The Austrians, despite vigorous resistance, enveloped the Serbian left wing and drove it in. The right wing was simultaneously threatened by an outflanking movement from Ralibara and a devastating artillery fire completed the discomfiture of the Servians, who by 8 o'clock in the afternoon were in full retreat on Arandjelovatz, abandoning all communications on which they had worked for years and which were considered impregnable. It is doubtful whether the Servians will make a stand at Arandjelovatz. The Servians had no time to bring off or to destroy their guns or supplies, great quantities of which fell into the hands of the Austrians. More than 5,000 Servians were taken prisoners.

For the first time since the outbreak of the war the Germans spent the day without their newspapers, the publication of which was suspended because of the religious day of repentance. The daily report from war headquarters appeared as usual but there was no means of circulating it except through bulletins posted in shop windows and by means of a telegraphic extract displayed in the post-offices downtown.

Four Persons Killed When Train Hits Auto

FORT WAYNE, Ind., Nov. 18.—Four persons were instantly killed at Conroy, O., thirty miles east of here, when the Pennsylvania five struck an automobile in which they were riding early today. The victims were Du Bois Leslie, mayor of Conroy; his wife and Dr. and Mrs. De Javea, parents of Mrs. Leslie.

FATAL ACCIDENTS FEW IN THE STATE

Nebraska Manufacturers Working Out Plan for Mutual Insurance Under the New Law.

ALL LIKE THE NEW SCHEME Expect Soon to Have Enough Signers So that the Company May Be Organized at Once to Begin Operations.

Fatal accidents happened in but five instances to employees of the hundred manufacturers of the state who were in session at the Paxton hotel yesterday, according to the number of hands raised when the question was asked. The question came up in a discussion of the workmen's compensation law. It was suggested that accidents resulting in fatalities seldom occur to employees of the manufacturing establishments of the state. The chairman asked the hands to be raised of those who had had a fatal accident in their plants. Only five went up.

Practically the entire morning was taken up by a discussion of the compensation system by George Wrightman of Des Moines, secretary of the Iowa State Manufacturers' association. He insisted that the mutual insurance company organized by and composed of the manufacturers themselves is the only proper and efficient company to handle the liability insurance of the manufacturers under these laws. "The stock casualty companies are doing all they can to fight us," he said. "They will fight your mutual company and try to put it out of business, but they might as well get out of the way, because the mutual company is the coming thing in this case, and it is bound to come."

Mutual is the Best. A. R. Kinney of Havanna brought up some interesting points. He reviewed a case in which a man had some defect in one of his arms. He had his arm broken later while employed in a factory. The doctors discovered the old defect in the arm and told him the only way he could ever be entirely sound would be to have an operation. He hurried to the hospital for the operation. "Now," said Kinney, "if I had been handling that case I would have had to pay it no doubt. If an insurance company were handling that kind of a case they would not pay for the doctor bill on a case they had not been responsible for."

Over twenty of the manufacturers have signed in favor of the organization of a mutual insurance company. The twenty represent an aggregate of 4,000 employees. The law requires that the signers must represent at least 5,000. They expect to get them before long.

Deserter Shot Five Times After Crossing to the American Side

NACO, ARIZ., Nov. 18.—Soldiers of the Carranza garrison at Naco, Sonora, fired five bullets into the body of Luciano Heres, a deserter, today after he had crossed the American boundary. In an effort to escape further service as a soldier, he was seriously wounded and was treated by American soldiers. Maytorena continued firing upon the Naco defenses today, but seemed to have withdrawn the greater part of his forces further away from the town. General Hill, commanding the garrison, directed a force from Agua Prieta would attack Maytorena from the rear. Another Mexican was shot last night on the American side of the boundary. All told twenty-seven persons have been wounded by stray bullets. Nine were American cavalrymen on border duty, two of whom died. Four were American civilians and the remainder Mexican men and women refugees. One woman died of wounds yesterday.
