## ZERO WEATHER AND SNOWSTRIKE OMAHA

Cold Comes Quite Unexpectedly. Giving Impression that it is Really Quite Chilly.

### NOWHERE NEAR THE RECORD

November Has Seen Many Days Colder, as Thermometer Did Not Get Quite Down to the Zero Mark.

There were some people who thought that for November cold the weather was seeking to establish a record yesterday morning. These people have another thing coming, for it was nothing like as cold as it had been. The coldest of the day was 7 o'clock in the morning. At that hour the local weather bureau recorded a temperature of 1 degree above zero. After that it grew warmer, and the promise is for fair weather Friday, with rising temperature.

What made it seem so cold, according to the weather office, was the fact that heretofore the weather has been very summer-like and the last drop in temperature came on suddenly.

The cold record for November in Omaha is 14 degrees below zero. That record was made some years ago, and November 27, 1887. However, last night's cold was a record for this early in the month. In 1875 and again in 1889 zero temperatures were reached during the first twenty-one days of the month.

### Snow Accompanies Cold.

Wednesday's night drop in temperature came along with a snowstorm, the first of the season. For a couple of hours here in Omaha there was a fairly heavy fall of snow, but it melted about as fast as it fell. In the morning, though, in many places the ground was still white.

However, it all disappeared before noon. Out in the state, according to the reports to the railroads, the weather was similar to the brand that was experienced in Omaha, though temperatures were lower. Everywhere there were snow squalls, with a couple of inches through the Black Hills country.

According to the railroads, Randolph held the Nebraska record for cold during the night. There the temperature dropped to 4 degrees below zero.

### Mercury Below Zero.

At O'Neill it was 4 degrees below, with 3 below at Ericson and 2 below all up through the Elkhorn river valley and from Norfolk through to Long Pine. It was 1 below at Fremont and Loup City, with zero at numerous points in the central portion of the state.

Sidney came along with a temperature of 3 below, while at Pine Bluff, just over the Nebraska line, it was three degrees colder.

Along the Missouri river section of Nebraska temperatures were from zero to 10 above, while out in Wyoming, up through the Basin country, the range was from 20 to 34 degrees above.

Mrs. Cotton was formerly Miss Lucy Gore of this city. She is a niece of Mrs. John S. Brady. Mr. Cotton is a son of Mrs. Herman Kountze. They were married October 19, 1904, in Omaha.

Mr. Cotton is known as a prominent member of Omaha clubs and is popular in social circles. He is now employed by the Burgess-Nash company.
