## GERMANS REPORT FRENCH REPULSE

Attempt of the Allies to Capture Combre, Southeast of Verdun, Proves Failure.

### SITUATION IN EAST UNCHANGED

Fighting Around Lodz and to East of Czenstochowa is Without Decision—Russians Capture Unoccupied Fort.

BERLIN, Nov. 20.—(By Wireless to London.)—The German troops have repulsed a French attack in the neighborhood of Verdun in France, and the Russian retreat in northwestern Poland continues, according to an official communication issued today by the German general army headquarters.

The text of the official statement reads: "In West Flanders and in North France no appreciable change in the situation has taken place."

"Heavy rains and snow, which first soaked and then partly froze the ground, have made our movements very difficult. A French attack at Combre, to the southeast of Verdun, was repulsed."

"The situation on the East Prussian frontier remains unchanged. East of the plain of the Masurian lakes the Russians captured an unoccupied fort, in which were some old obsolete cannon. The retreat of the enemy through Lipno and Newami continues. Our attack has made progress to the south of Plock."

"No decision yet has been reached in the fighting around Lodz and to the east of Czenstochowa."

for home defense and the other for foreign service.

With regard to the suggestions that Lord Kitchener's army of recruits should be treated unlike the professional soldiers, Mr. Tennant, who asked: "The chief characteristic of Lord Kitchener is not sentiment, nor even persuasive eloquence. These advocates of differential treatment would make him change his decision in a matter on which he feels strongly."

### Will Interne Enemy's Money.

The attorney general, Sir John A. Simon, introduced in the House of Commons an interesting amendment to the act covering trading with the enemy. He said his aim was to stop the transmission of money or credits which would be advantageous to the enemy. Everybody holding property in trust, such as dividends, profits, etc., belonging to enemies of the empire in Germany, Austria and Turkey would henceforth be required, under penalty, to pay these profits to a public trustee. The attorney general explained that indiscriminate confiscation was not intended. "We are preserving the enemy's property until the end of the war," he said; "what will happen to it at the end of the war can very properly be decided then."

### Prohibits Export of Tea.

Great Britain today prohibited the exportation of tea to all continental ports except those of the countries of the allies and of Spain and Portugal. This prohibition is due to indications that Germany is receiving large supplies of tea through the Netherlands.

## PIONEER OF DAKOTAS IS DEAD IN DULUTH

DULUTH, Minn., Nov. 20.—Marion Douglas, 65 years old, a resident of Duluth since 1888, a pioneer of the Dakotas and one of the well known lawyers of Minnesota, is dead at his home here, after an illness of more than a year, of hardening of the arteries. He was born in Maine.

## Mexican Dog Weighs but a Pound



Two very valuable dogs—worth their weight in silver—got in gold—and no bigger than a minute have arrived from the province of Chihuahua, Mexico, for Arthur D. Brandeis. The dogs were purchased in Mexico for Mr. Brandeis by a friend. One of them weighs less than a pound and the other tips the scale at a pound.

## SPECIAL AGENTS GET MURDERERS

The two murderers boarded Conductor Reynolds' train late Tuesday night, getting into a freight car. When a few miles west of Rutland they crawled out of the freight car, made their way over a gondola car and entered the caboose, intending to rob whoever might be riding therein. As they entered the front door they commenced shooting at the feet of the conductor to scare him. Instead of being scared the conductor started to grapple with one of them. Then they both fired, one bullet striking Reynolds in the shoulder and the other in the face, going entirely through the head and producing almost instant death.

In the scuffle the three men had worked their way to the car platform, and as Reynolds was shot he staggered and fell to the ground. The train was going about twenty miles per hour. The two men jumped off, went through the conductor's pocket and then fled to the country. They hid their masks of red flannel and threw their revolvers into a water tank some five miles from the scene of the shooting. Then they separated, and yesterday both of them were caught, after which they took the officers to the places where the revolvers and masks were hid. After this they confessed the shooting and were taken to Humboldt, where they were lodged in the Dakota county, Ia., jail. Both men will be charged with murder.

## FREDERICK MOLLENHAUER, SUGAR REFINER, IS DEAD

NEW YORK, Nov. 20.—Frederick Mollenhauer, millionaire sugar refiner, died suddenly of heart disease today at his home in Brooklyn. He was 64 years old.

## Weather in East and South Coldest for Forty Years

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—The cold wave with some snow, which swept rapidly down from the northwest and spread over the south Atlantic states from Virginia to Florida today has forced temperatures to the lowest recorded in November in forty years. Weather bureau officials predicted killing frosts and freezing temperatures would extend as far south on the coast as Palm Beach. The cold also extends northwest from Florida through the Ohio valley and over the plains states. The wave has moved southeasterly and will be dissipated in a few days.

A storm originating off the Carolina coast Wednesday morning has extended to New England and caused gales and rain on the coast there and heavy snow in the interior of New England and northern New York. Snow is predicted to continue in New England and along the great lakes tonight.

Cold wave warnings have been issued for Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, the Carolinas, Virginia and central Florida.

## CARRANZA ARMY LEAVES CAPITAL

Consul Silliman Reports to Secretary Bryan that the Troops Are Departing.

### MOVE RECORDS TO ORIZABA

Villa's Troops Said to Be Near the City—Railroad Service to the North and East is Interrupted.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—American Consul Silliman in a dispatch filed in Mexico City at 5 o'clock last night reports that General Obregon's troops were entraining for Orizaba and moving the offices of the government with them.

Consul Silliman added that the city was in a state of decided unrest. He did not indicate whether the Obregon troops were evacuating the city to leave it undefended before the troops approaching from the north, or whether his forces were to be replaced with other Carranza troops moving down from Queretaro under General Gonzalez, one of Carranza's chief supporters.

Mr. Silliman added that railroad communication northward and also between the capital and Vera Cruz was interrupted.

Previous reports have left it to be understood that a sufficient garrison would remain in the capital to maintain order and prevent entrance of the Zapata forces until Villa's forces were in the immediate vicinity and ready to enter, when the Carranza troops would withdraw.

Acting Secretary Lansing conferred with Acting Secretary Frothingham of the War department and Brigadier General Scott, chief of staff, over details of the evacuation of Vera Cruz. It was decided that the customs collected during the period of occupation, supposed to be aggregate more than \$1,000,000, would be brought away by Major General Funston, to be held in this country for delivery to the government which is finally recognized.

Foreign Minister Pabello telegraphed the Carranza agency here today a formal declaration that hostilities with Villa had broken out and telling of the appointment of military commanders for the various states and districts.

that the French positions at Chauvencourt have been blown up by German mines, with heavy losses for the French, and that the Germans then occupied these positions.

"Advices from Rome are to the effect that in the fighting at El Arish, a fortified Egyptian town on the Mediterranean, the British suffered heavy losses. The Italian colony in Egypt is suffering from the prostration of all lines of trade.

"The commander of the British forces in Egypt declared that it was only its treaties with the allies which led England to fight against Turkey. From all sections of Egypt came reports of enthusiastic manifestations in favor of a holy war. The Sheik-Ul-Islam has communicated with a majority of the Mohammedan princes of Asia and Africa, who declare they will assist Turkey in a war against England.

"The London Times estimates the Russian losses in their last defeat by General von Hindenburg at 40,000 to 60,000. The Austrians captured eighteen machine guns and several large field guns.

"The Popolo Romano and the Preparazione, Rome newspapers, say that further resistance on the part of the Serbians is impossible."
