Morgenthau what had happened and took the Tennessee to Grecian waters, fifty or sixty miles distant, at the request of the ambassador, while the latter endeavored to get into communication with the consul

general at Smyrna and learn the exact cause of the firing.
Officials Are Suspicious.
State department officials estimated that from recent delays in messages from Constantinople, they should hear tomorrow or Sunday from Ambassador Morgenthau on the incidents connected with the firing. They had no doubt, however, that all would be satisfactorily explained. It is considered probable that as a result of the firing of several Turkish

boats, and the sensitiveness of the Ottoman government on account of the presence of foreign warships, even of neutral nations, near its coast, the American cruiser may be kept at Chios, Greece, or some of the other numerous islands belonging to Greece, which are but a half day's sail from Asia Minor.
For the present the Tennessee is being held at Chios, while the North Carolina is at Beirut, Asia Minor. The captain of the latter ship, however, sent his message to the Navy department from Alexandria, Egypt.

Wishes of Washington.
Each commander had been asked to acknowledge receipt of Secretary Daniels' orders, as officials here were particularly anxious that the naval commanders take no action of their own initiative, the naval regulations giving officers ordinarily wide discretion under such circumstances.
The Tennessee and North Carolina will not be withdrawn from the western Mediterranean, it was stated today at the Navy department, no matter where the responsibility for the firing lay. The vessels will be kept within easy reach of Turkish ports to afford every assistance possible to distressed Americans, should emergencies arise.

The driver and Seward Day were thrown clear of the wreck. The men who were taken from beneath the car and brought to Tecumseh, where they were given surgical care are:
John Fitzpatrick, pelvis bone broken and bruised about the head.
Clifford Jones, concussion of the brain and three ribs broken.
Van Crew, wrist broken and three ribs broken.
Arthur Fitzpatrick, collar bone broken.
The other boys less seriously hurt were Lloyd Philpott and Ray Rich.
