

Recites Conversation. She said that the phone conversation

was as follows: "Del, will you come to Det:

Del: "No, I will not meet you at the Midway. I'm shaving, and in fifteen minutes I will teave my house." That was all the conversation she over-heard, Mrs. Huston testified. After cross-examination by ex-Senator Norris Brown of counsel for the defense, who nominated District Attorney Howell to his position, the latter said to Mrs. Hus-

Other Witnesses Testify. Other government witnesses at the morning session, with the substance of their testimony, were as follows:
