FIRST CAR SOLD IN OMAHA

Dr. I. B. Bushman Makes First Purchase and C. M. Garvey Buys First Delivery Car from Murphy-O'Brien Company.

The first Dodge Brothers' car, a product over which there has been for many months conjecture, rumor and speculation regarding quality, quantity and price, has at last reached Omaha and is on display at the Murphy-O'Brien company, local agents, at Nineteenth and Farnam streets. The car arrived Thursday evening and several demonstrations were made Friday.

The first sale in Omaha has been made and the Murphy-O'Brien company is preparing to accommodate with early deliveries some 100 customers who have already signed orders. The first sale was made to Dr. I. B. Bushman, Dr. H. L. Arnold purchased the second car a few seconds after Dr. Bushman. The first delivery car was sold to C. M. Garvey of the Puritan laundry, and Burgess-Nash and Brandels have signed complimentary orders.

Give Informal Banquet.

Charles Hurst, district representative for Dodge Brothers and the Murphy-O'Brien company were guests at an informal banquet for the newspaper fraternity at the Henshaw hotel yesterday.

The new car is rather a surprise to even those who expected the most. Almost as large as cars selling at \$1,500, with a speed reaching as high as fifty-five miles an hour and so low that it can travel on high without registering on the speedometer, a feat that four-cylinder cars can accomplish and with all the graceful lines of the newest style and design, the new car is a much more finished product than expected.

Car Completely Equipped.

The car is completely equipped with all modern accessories, including such conveniences as electric lights with dimmers and automatic focusing device, one-man top and instrument board.

BAR ON TESTIMONY OF WEBBERT HOLDS

her husband were attending a theater the night of the robbery, he had left the theater for almost an hour. He had also left his bed once during the night, she said. She also told of having seen Sammons go to see Smith at the latter's house one month after the robbery, and she said that Sammons had remained there for two hours.

Mrs. Huston, the other principal witness of the morning session, recounted a telephone conversation, supposedly between Walter Sammons and Delbert Smith, which she had overheard on a party line after the robbery. The government, it is understood, had hoped to show by her testimony that Sammons was trying to induce Smith to shoulder the entire blame for the crime. However, under the sharp objections of the defense, that allegation was not introduced into the record, only a verbatim report of the alleged conversation being admitted from Mrs. Huston.

Recites Conversation.

She said that the phone conversation was as follows:

Walt: "Del, will you come to my office?"

Del: "No, I will not go to your office."

Walt: "Will you meet me at the Midway?"

Del: "No, I will not meet you at the Midway. I'm shaving, and in fifteen minutes I will leave my house."

That was all the conversation she overheard, Mrs. Huston testified. After cross-examination by ex-Senator Norris Brown of counsel for the defense, who nominated District Attorney Howell in his position, the latter said to Mrs. Huston:

"In other words, you were an eavesdropper? That's what the senator wants to know. Just an eavesdropper?"

"Yes," Mrs. Huston replied.

Other Witnesses Testify.

Other government witnesses at the morning session, with the substance of their testimony, were as follows: George Tracy, a Kearney liquor dealer; told of being with Delbert Smith from 11:30 till 1:30 o'clock the night of the robbery; also of Smith telling his alibi to Tracy; when questioned as to alleged illegal sale of liquor in Kearney, the witness refused to answer, on grounds that he did not have to give testimony that might incriminate himself; his testimony was partly facetious, and caused laughter in court, which was rebuked by Judge Morris.

Arthur Fife, a Kearney bartender, said he saw Walter Sammons from 9 and 10 o'clock the night of the robbery, and that he appeared to be quite sober then, and may have been on his way home.

Henry Lambert, a Kearney storekeeper, put on the stand as an "expert" locksmith, said he was familiar with locks, and that he had also been in the bakery and grocery business; he failed to understand a question which Judge Morris and counsel for the defense declared to be quite obvious. He was abruptly dismissed, after the prosecution discovered that he did not give the testimony they expected.

Cletus Pierce of Kearney said he saw Sammons and Smith together over a month after the robbery.

Re-examination Over.

The morning session was continued until 12:30 p. m., in an effort to hasten the conclusion of the trial.

Although the government's testimony is practically concluded, the defense will require several days for its evidence, so the trial is certain to run over well into next week.

What Sammons Said to Rice. At the afternoon session of Court Post-office Inspector A. L. Rice testified that Sammons advised him that the time had passed when the inspectors could do good work and suggested that a fascinating woman be secured to inveigle suspects.

Sammons suggested that the following Kearney men would bear watching, according to Rice: Harry Dildine, Ulysses Brown, Hallock Kallorn, an ex-bartender and some railroad men, Herbert Swan, Clarence Cummings and one of the

guards. He said Sammons kept coming to his office to proffer assistance.

Rice testified that Sammons told him that Cummings' wife had told Dr. T. Kirby she "hoped to God they never would catch the thieves."

At one conference the inspectors held behind locked doors with Delbert Smith, Rice said Smith was accused of the theft and denied it. He was several times accused that evening and always denied it.

tempted a raid on these locks, which are built in a semi-circle. Their attack, which was conducted in a number of armed automobiles, was repulsed.

The fortifications which have been constructed all through West Flanders for use in case of an eventual German retreat, evidently now are complete, for the troops employed in their construction have all gone to the front.

The snow in Flanders continues. There is much illness among the men in the trenches and the last few days have seen little fighting.

French Review of Situation.

PARIS, Nov. 20.—The French official communication issued this afternoon says that yesterday there were hardly any infantry attacks on the part of the enemy and that their artillery activity also was largely reduced.

The text of the communication follows:

"The day of November 19 was marked by the almost total absence of infantry attacks on the part of the enemy; at the same time their artillery fire was much less violent than on the afternoon of November 18.

"To the north the weather has been very bad, and snow has fallen. All the region of the Yser canal, to the east of Dixmude is invaded by the waters. In front of Ramscappelle we have withdrawn from the water two 165 centimeter mortars abandoned by the Germans. There has been a very fairly intense artillery fire to the south of Ypres.

"On the center there have been no important actions to report. In the Argonne

three vigorous attacks on the part of the enemy's infantry have been repulsed.

"On our right wing the Germans have recaptured the destroyed section of Chauvencourt. Further to the east we have made some progress."

Four Laborers Killed in Dynamite Explosion

BURLINGTON, Ia., Nov. 20.—Four laborers, employed on the government levee, twenty miles north of Burlington, were killed by dynamite at noon today. The men were thawing the explosive when the accident occurred.

German Liner Sunk in Persian Gulf

LONDON, Nov. 20.—The Daily News states that news has been received that the Hamburg-American liner Elbatana has been sunk in the Persian gulf. There are no details of how this was accomplished.

The Elbatana, a vessel of about 3,000 tons, was last reported as having arrived at Bussorah, Asiatic Turkey, early in August.

Before being permitted to sit on the jury each prospective juror was required to swear that he never flirted.
