

WORKMEN SETTLE THEIR DISPUTES

Work is Resumed on the Fontenelle Hotel and the United States National Bank Building.

ALL ARE BACK ON THE JOBS

How the Difficulty is Settled is Not Revealed, Although it is Said the Bricklayers Were Made Arbitrators.

The thirty plasterers who struck on the Fontenelle hotel job last Monday went back to work at 10 o'clock yesterday. Just how the difficulty was settled is not known to the general contractors or subcontractors.

It was a difficulty between the tile setters and the plasterers as to which should be privileged to do certain work, said Charles Anderson of Anderson Bros., contractors, who have the plastering job. "Now they have settled it some way and are all back at work. I did not inquire into the details of how they settled it. I only know that they are back at work, and so long as they are all working, that is the important thing to me."

Bricklayers Arbitrators.

It is known, however, that in a general way the matter was a few days ago submitted to the bricklayers' union for arbitration. The question was whether the plasterers or the tile setters should spread the coat of cement that must be put on the tile wall before the marble facing is set. The tile setters declared the spreading of this cement was their work because it was a part of the task of setting the marble. The plasterers asserted it was their work because it was practically the same as plastering. The tile setters came back with the argument that if they should let the plasterers put on this coat of cement and then follow them up with the marble, the cement would be hard and dry before they could get to it, and thus the marble could not be made to stick. They held this was unreasonable.

When the matter came to the bricklayers for arbitration, they rather took the view that the tile setters' side of the contention and circulated papers getting the views of the unions in other crafts on the matter. The result was that a large list of signatures was readily piled up in favor of the tile setters' side of the question.

The plasterers are back to work, and, as the contractors agree, that is the vital issue with the man who is trying to finish a job by a given date or pay a forfeit.

Omaha Invites the State Teachers to Return Next Year

Secretary E. U. Graff of the Nebraska State Teachers' association is mailing 3,000 ballots to school teachers to vote on association officials. Ballots are also being mailed for voting on the place of the next meeting. With these ballots go the invitations of Omaha and Lincoln, the only two cities in the race for the convention.

Suffrage Campaign Expense List Filed

The suffrage campaign in Nebraska, beginning December 20, 1913, cost \$5,344.17, according to a statement filed at the court house by John L. Boyd, treasurer of the local suffrage association. Contributions amounted to \$5,842.50, leaving a balance of \$13.63. Mr. and Mrs. Kennedy have contributed \$2,500 to the cause of suffrage, according to statements filed.

WARMER WEATHER OVER WESTERN PART OF STATE

Warmer weather has returned to Nebraska, according to the reports to the railroads and throughout the state, temperatures ranging from 19 to 48 degrees above zero. Ashland, with 19 degrees above, was the coldest point in the state. The warm spots were out in the western portions, with corresponding high temperatures over in Wyoming.

Generally it is clear, though the reports from the far west portions of Wyoming and Montana indicate that out that way a storm is brewing.
