AFFAIRS AT SOUTH OMAHA

Prohibition Hill Stirred Up Over Alleged Ghost and His Wanderings. SHADE OF TONY HYDOCK Strange Pranks Are Getting on Nerves of Neighbors—Constable Kane Is Investigating the Mystery. Prohibition hill and the vicinity of Thirty-third and L streets is wrought up over the alleged nightly appearance of the ghost of the late Tony Hydock, for many years a well known resident of that section, who before his death assured his friends and neighbors that he would "come back." According to Justice of the Peace P. C. Caldwell, complaints have come to his office against the doings of Hydock's ghost. Caldwell says that a man who lives in the Prohibition hill section complains that the neighborhood is very much frightened over the nightly visits of the ghost, which is alleged to have done things that require more than the ordinary muscle vouchsafed a spirit. For instance, it is asserted that the "ghost" visited a house some nights ago and after splitting the window open with an ax took three left shoes from three pairs that were in the house. Another story is that while a number of his old cronies were discussing "Tony" in one of the places known on the hill as the "Bull Pen," Tony's "ghost" entered the place and upset a bench upon which thirteen men were seated. Others say that Tony has been seen seated on the porch of a saloon on Prohibition hill. Some days ago a man called at Caldwell's court, so the judge says, and asked to have Constable William Kane detailed to protect his place of business against the visits of the "ghost." The weird thing about the alleged ghostly visits is that Hydock, who was a man of positive opinion, once he is said to have openly declared that he would "sure come back and see the 'bunch'."

J. McMahon. Lepinski, it is said, will get one place and McMahon the other. There are a number of other candidates for the places. French Army Buys Horses. Representatives of the French army and contractors from the commissary of the French government will arrive in South Omaha today to buy horses for the army. Captain Count de Lafayette will be in charge of the inspection work. Upwards of 8,000 horses will be bought this trip, a part of which number will be obtained at South Omaha. The regulations in the choice of the animals is very strict according to local stockmen. The opening sale day is scheduled for Saturday. Form Federation of Clubs. Taking the final stride in their growth, the improvement clubs of the city combined last night in one confederated organization known as the "Federation of Improvement Clubs." The seven improvement clubs of the city, the Southeast, the Northeast, the Springlake, the Northwest, the West Side, the Lincoln club and the Bohemian-American clubs all met in a representative meeting, and not only organized a federation but elected officers to the new organization. J. E. Heath was elected president, F. W. Black, vice president; J. E. Jensen, secretary, and William Schneider, treasurer. In continuation of the movements of the different clubs during the last year, the new organization will take an active interest in local civic affairs, having for its aim the pleasure of the people of the different districts the clubs represent. A special committee was named to investigate the proposed electric light contact. Spend Charity Fund at Home. George Depray, president of the South Omaha Belgian Relief society, will keep the money raised by the society and administer it here in the interests of Belgian war orphans instead of sending the money to Belgium as was at first intended. The society has \$275 in the treasury and more coming in. On tomorrow night the society will give a ball to raise sufficient money to bring over a number of orphans to the city. The orphans will be placed in the St. James' Orphan asylum and the Omaha Child Saving institute when they arrive and will be looked after in those institutions until homes can be found for them among the Belgian people of Omaha and South Omaha. Rev. Father Roche of St. James' orphanage and Mrs. A. A. McGraw of the Child Saving institute have assured the local Belgians that they will find room for the orphans when they come. Early Morning Fire. Fire, caused by defective wiring, nearly destroyed the home of Mrs. Edna Rainer, 1205 North Twenty-fourth street, at 5:27 this morning. The blaze had gotten a big start before it was noticed by a passerby. It had worked from the kitchen to the garret before the firemen were called. In consequence little could be done to check the flames. The loss amounted to \$1,500, of which amount \$1,000 was on the building and \$500 on the furniture. Plans for Tag Day.
