

BOATS MAY SOON PLY THE MISSOURI

Navigation Company Declares it Would Be Glad to Co-Operate with Omaha to Open River.

RUNNING NOW AT KANSAS CITY

Missouri River Boats Pronounced a Success at That Point and Service May Be Extended Here.

That the Kansas City Missouri River Navigation Company would be glad to cooperate with Omaha business men in arranging an extension of the Missouri river navigation to Omaha, was learned by J. W. Gamble and Robert Manley Friday when they were in Kansas City looking into the proposition of Missouri river navigation. The two men were sent to Kansas City by the trade extension committee of the Commercial club to make an investigation and a report on the proposition.

The committee spent the day with General Manager A. W. Mackie of the navigation company going through the warehouses, over the docks and even looking over the company books for a record of the business handled.

The company has been navigating the river for four years between Kansas City and St. Louis, and although it was expected it would run at a loss for some time, the business would have been on a paying basis this year were it not for the war, which put an end to a large flour exporting trade the boats had been carrying.

The boats used on this route draw three and one-half feet of water. It was explained to the Omaha committee that perhaps a slightly smaller boat would have to be used on the trip between Kansas City and Omaha, but that navigation would doubtless be entirely practicable. Kansas City has a municipal terminal and it was pointed out that Omaha boats if it remained there would be at little or no expense for dockage.

The committee will make a full report to the trade extension committee next week with recommendations.

Two Autos Upset And Occupants Barely Escape

Two automobiles were completely wrecked and several men painfully bruised in two separate accidents southeast of Council Bluffs late Thursday night. In both incidents the cars turned completely over while making turns at speed.

The first accident occurred near the Iowa School for the Deaf. The car, a big Mitchell, was being driven by its owner, John Flynn of Lincoln. In the car with him was Herbert Deitchler, also of Lincoln. Flynn turned from the road in passing a wagon and went far out toward a ditch. To prevent running into it he turned his car at a sharp angle, the momentum causing it to turn a complete somersault. Flynn was caught underneath the car and Deitchler was pinned down by the running board. He succeeded, however, in working himself loose and was trying to pry up the car to release his companion when Henry Studebaker of Treynor came along with a party of friends in another big car. They quickly lifted the wrecked car and released Mr. Flynn and provided for his care by sending him to his home in charge of friends in another automobile. Neither of the men was seriously injured. The car was a complete wreck and was left lying by the side of the road.

Mr. Studebaker then continued his journey, to within exactly the same accident at a point two miles down the road. His car took a headlong plunge and landed upside down in the road. All of the men were thrown out or jumped at the critical moment and all escaped being caught underneath. All were slightly bruised, but none painfully hurt. The second accident occurred near what is known as the "Dead man's crossing" of the Wabash railroad near Tony creek. A garage man of Treynor was called by telephone and towed the damaged car home.

GERMANS ADVANCE TOWARD WARSAW

Teuton Armies Reported Within Few Marches of the Old Capital of Poland.

THEY FORCE WAY BY FIGHTING

It is Believed Russians Will Continue to Retire Until Place Fixed on for Battle is Reached.

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PETROGRAD, Nov. 21.—(Special Cablegram to New York World and Omaha Bee.)—The Germans, advancing directly from Thorn along both banks of the Vistula, have gained points within a few marches of Warsaw, and are still forcing their way along by direct fighting.

The Russians are continuing their steady penetration of East Prussia, and 20 miles to the south the Russian left is investing Cracow. This is about all correspondents here are permitted to know.

The situation is precisely that of the anxious periods which preceded the defeats of the Germans on the Nieman and before Warsaw.

Where the main Russian forces are and what the strategic plan is now in course of execution can not even be guessed, but the importance of that, which is now in preparation, far exceeds anything that has gone before.

What object the Germans have to attain by their headlong charge upon Warsaw, from a military point of view, is difficult to understand. It is a move that perhaps may be utilized powerfully from a political point of view. Germany has set Turkey upon the Russian rear and is straining every nerve by methods of bribery of the press and the manipulation of public opinion and other methods to force several Balkan states into conflict against Russia, but principally Germany is suspected now of desiring to gain some advantage which, reported in customary Germanic coloring, may suffice to bring Sweden into the arena.

So far as known the Russians are relying on fighting before the second German invasion and will continue to retire until the place fixed upon by Grand Duke Nicholas for the final effort is reached. When the veil is lifted, which now conceals the entire theater of war on this front, it will once more show that the Germans have been outwitted by the strategy of the grand duke.

What official Russian spokesmen say is that the present situation is serious, but is favorable to Russia, and their manner of saying quite plainly conveys perfect confidence in the result.

Two Earling Men Injured in Crash

Herman Block of Earling, Ia., and his son were severely shaken up, but it is said, not dangerously injured when they were struck by a fast Rock Island freight train at the foot of McPherson Avenue, Council Bluffs, where there is a double crossing. They had stopped their car to let a Milwaukee train pass and did not see the other eastbound train which struck one rear wheel of the car, demolishing it and throwing them a considerable distance. They were taken to Edmondson hospital.

Russian Warships Shell Khopa Port

PETROGRAD (Via London), Nov. 21.—The following official communication from the headquarters of the army of the Caucasus was issued last night: "Russian warships on November 19 bombarded the port of Khopa, in Turkish Armenia, about eighteen miles southwest of Batum, on the Black Sea, whence the Turks were preparing for an offensive movement in the direction of different passes of the Zatcharek region. "The port barracks and the custom house were destroyed, the ammunition depot was blown up and the place set on fire."

Washington Affairs

The Federal Reserve board announced a change in the rediscount rate for the United States Federal Reserve bank, on thirty-day paper, from 5 per cent to 6 per cent, putting the Boston bank on the same footing as those in New York and Philadelphia.

The internal revenue bureau notified internal revenue collectors that under the war revenue act, the stamp tax applies to bonds accompanying mortgages, but is not required upon certificates of the officer taking acknowledgment of deeds and mortgages.

The cold wave over the southern states, forcing the mercury below the freezing point and extending north to the middle Atlantic states, had spent its force last night and according to forecasters at the weather bureau, a reaction with quick effect is bringing higher temperatures.

Negotiations between Sir George Falsh, representing the British government, and federal reserve and American bankers probably will come to a conclusion next week. Officials familiar with the progress of the conferences are confident that an answer to the American suggestions, called to London by Sir George, will be received either tomorrow or Monday, and while they had no definite assurances on the subject, they are hopeful the reply will be favorable.

Statement Issued By Mogy Bernstein

Probation Officer Mogy Bernstein, following publication of reports current at the court house that he will not be reappointed probation officer at the end of this year, issued a statement emphasizing the fact that he does not intend to resign his position. His term continues until January 1.

The statement follows: "I have no present intention of resigning the position of probation officer. While it is true I am interested in other ventures, the salary of juvenile officer being rather small for the support of a family, it is also true that the affairs of this position take up the major portion of my time. And I believe those who know me will bear me out when I say that this has been a labor of love with me. Therefore, it is not likely that I shall resign what has been practically my life work, unless, of course, the good citizens of Douglas county, speaking through the district judges, should feel that my services are no longer needed in this important position. "As yet I have heard no unkind criticism of my work and I cannot imagine who is spreading the information that came to The Bee, unless someone who hopes to secure the position."
