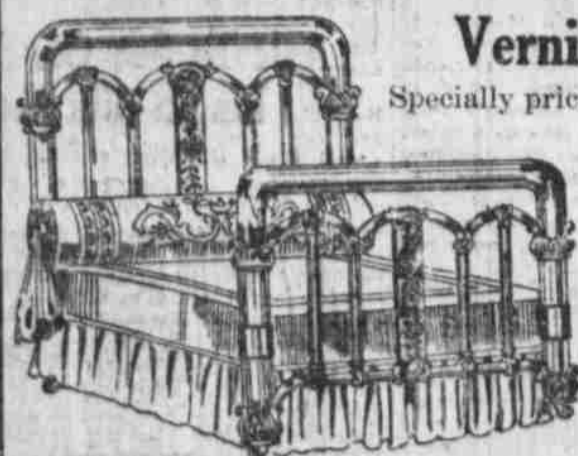
Play in "The College Hero" for Charity



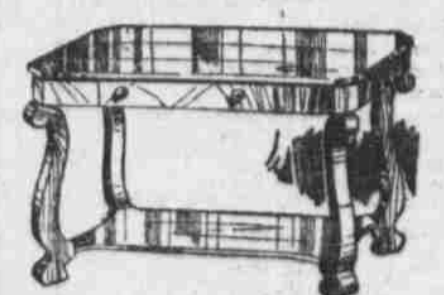
