



Potter Always Ready. Nebraska's secondary defense and Herb Potter, playing safety, kept the Iowa score to one touchdown. Time and again Garretson, Parson, Carberry and Gross broke through the line and were only downed by that secondary defense On numerous occasions the Hawkeyes started well-balanced forward passes that escaped everybody but the vigilant Potter, The little Husker quarter speiled many passes which, if successful, would have given the Iowa runner a clear field to the goal line. Chamberlain, the sensational halfback, who had in previous games broken away for frequent long runs, was powerless. Not once did he make a gain of over six yards. Rutherford, while consistent, barely averaged five and six yards. Delamatre worked up to standard at fullback and Potter and Halligan and Howard shone brilliantly, but the rest of the team was minerably weak.
