

CATTLE PLAGUE CONTROLLED
Lifting of Quarantine from Canada
Taken as Encouraging Sign.

FOUR STATES YET AFFECTED
Most Serious Instances of Hoof and
Mouth Disease Existing Are in
Ohio, Illinois, Indiana and
Pennsylvania.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23.—The lifting of the quarantine against Canada because of the foot and mouth disease is regarded by officials of the Department of Agriculture as encouraging evidence that they are on the outside of the disease. "This means," says a statement today by the department, "that there are grounds for the belief that quarantines already declared have been sufficient to stop the movement of infected cattle, and that the disease can now be held within the limits of the areas already quarantined."

"Another cause for encouragement is the fact that although a shipment of infected cattle reached Spokane, Wash., some days ago, no new cases have since been reported from that state. This is taken to mean that the diseased cattle were killed and buried before they had had an opportunity to spread the disease. In consequence, it has not been necessary to quarantine Washington.

District Narrows Down.
"At the present time the states most seriously affected are Ohio, Illinois, Indiana and Pennsylvania.

"Outside of this belt, the state of Connecticut, Rhode Island and Massachusetts are perhaps the subject of the greatest concern. Although the actual number of cattle already infected is comparatively small, it will probably be some time before any of the quarantines can be lifted in this region."

"The greatest encouragement of all, however, is probably found in Michigan," the statement continues. "The outbreak originated in Michigan and it first spread east. Now, however, it is believed that all infected stock have been buried and the state, it is hoped, is really clean. In Iowa and Wisconsin the infected areas appear to be definitely defined and portions of these states may soon be released from quarantine.

"Although the spread of the disease into areas previously uninfected seems to have been in a great measure checked, it is estimated that it will take at least six months to stamp out all traces of the infection."

Flynn is Hearing
Complaints Against
Railroad Tariffs

Examining Attorney Leo J. Flynn of Washington, D. C., has started a three-day hearing at the federal building, for the accommodation of lawyers for complainants and defendants in railroad rate cases. He is accompanied by Whitfield Hamis, official reporter, and they will take arguments and evidence for both sides, to be submitted to the Interstate Commerce commission for decision. Among the attorneys appearing for complainants is E. J. McVann, manager of the traffic bureau of the Omaha Commercial club, who will handle the cases of several shippers who seek to block increases in railroad rates.

For an hour he was kept in jail and then released on promise that he would not skip the country, after friends had signed his bond. He was asked to see Chief of Police H. W. Dunn about the "crime" he had committed. Dunn impressed Peters with the seriousness of the offense. Latta and the other conspirators have managed to keep Peters from finding out that it was a joke and a frame-up.

Possession of Sherman Hall, 6 years of age, is at stake in a habeas corpus hearing to be held in District Judge English's court at 9:30 o'clock Tuesday morning. His divorced parents and the St. James orphanage at Benson are parties to the suit. Sherman's mother, who is now Mrs. Minnie Hall Riley, informed the court in a petition that the lad was placed in the orphanage in 1911; that the father has not been heard from for a month, and that she desires to have the care of him. The orphanage has refused to give him up, she asserts.
