

Turkey to Refuse to Permit Diplomats to Send Code Wires

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.-The Turkish government has notified the cable companies that messages from or to belligerent countries will not be admitted to Turkey either terminally or in transit, according to an announcement made here today by the Commercial Cable company. Further, representatives of neutral powors in Turkey will not be permitted to exchange telegrams in code or cipher with their home offices or with the representatives of other neutral powers, WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.-Officials here say it is an undisputed principle of international law that a representative of neutral country may maintain communication with his home government in secret. Big Boost in Ment Rates. The packing interests are also vitally affected. "The agricultural implement field offers a striking example of what the increase entails. The proposed increased tariff affects many of the necessities of life other than purely packing house products. Farmers' Associations Help. We are pleased to say that we are being helped in our propaganda by the Co-Operative Farmers' association, which owns 2,000 grain elevators in the affected area and has a membership of over 250,-600. In addition, other bodies of equal importance and as vitally interested are alding us. These are not actuated solely by reifish motives, but are fighting for the national good and for the great body of the people.

"There has been a national cry that the rallways throughout the country through lack of money have been forced to curtall and, indeed, in some cases, to practically stop the buying of supplies. In spite of this plaint, for the year ending 1913 they purchased over \$60,000,000 worth more of supplies than in any previous For the year which ended in July, 1914, there was bought by the rallways over \$9,000,000 worth more supplies than in any like period.

Borrowing Power Not Curtailed. "It has also been stated that railway earnings are so small as to jeopardize the credit of the roads and, therefore, that it has been well nigh impossible for them to borrow sufficient money to make necessary improvements. However, I proved before the Interstate Commerc commission that a certain railroad had borrowed at a rate of not over 5 per cent \$3,000,000 on the security of one-year notes. There is no other business in this country, I maintained and proved at that time, that could do likewise. These facts surely prove that we are entitled in justice to the Interests represented by us to have the benefit of a careful investigation made by the Interstate Commerce commission. 
