POULTRY DEALER IS ASSASSINATED

Murder Conspiracy in New York City that Rivals Rosenthal Case in Sensationalism. LURED TO STREET AND SHOT

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—The assassination of Barnett Raff, characterized by coroners' jury as the culmination of the greatest conspiracy since the murder of Herman Rosenthal, placed a real murder mystery in the central office today for solution.

The victim, a well-to-do independent poultry dealer, was lured to his death by a decoy message given by a young man who entered his place of business in Washington market. Two shots fired in the street killed him. Two men darted to an automobile waiting nearby and made off.

It is said that the Austrian columns, which on the night of November 22 crossed the Kolubara river in northwestern Serbia were put to rout by the Serbians with large losses.

Chile Sends Warship to Capture Alleged German Naval Base

VALPARAISO, Chile, Nov. 25.—In pursuance of its announced intention of enforcing strict neutrality, the Chilean government today dispatched the destroyer, Capitán Merino, Tarpa and Captain O'Brien, to the Juan Fernandez islands, Chilean possessions, 400 miles off the coast. The warships sailed under sealed orders.

FOREST FIRES NEAR LITTLE ROCK SUBSIDE

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Nov. 25.—Forest fires that have approached as close as two miles of the east section of this city, subsided somewhat today and with no wind to spread them fear for the safety of the city was allayed. Great black clouds of smoke, however, hovered over the city and lights were burning in buildings. Conditions in other parts of the fire swept area were reported unchanged.
