The matter of Dr. Graves' connection with the government has come up in the House of Commons on more than one occasion in the last two years, but today is the first time the government has clearly repudiated him.

Grman Naval Base

VALPARAISO, Chile, Nov. 15.-In pursuance of its announced intention of enforcing strict neutrality, the Chilean goverament today dispatched the destroyers, Capital Merino, Tarpa and Capitan O'Brien, to the Juan Fernandez islands, Chilean possessions, 400 miles off the coast. The warships sailed under scaled orders.

The authorities at the port of Antofagasta removed vital parts of the engine of the German steamer Karnack, notwithstanding the promise of the German minister that German steamers would not leave Chilean ports.

An official statement of the Chilean maritime authorities yesterday said it had been proved that German warships had violated the neutrality of Chile by staying for several days in the Juan Fernanden islands.
