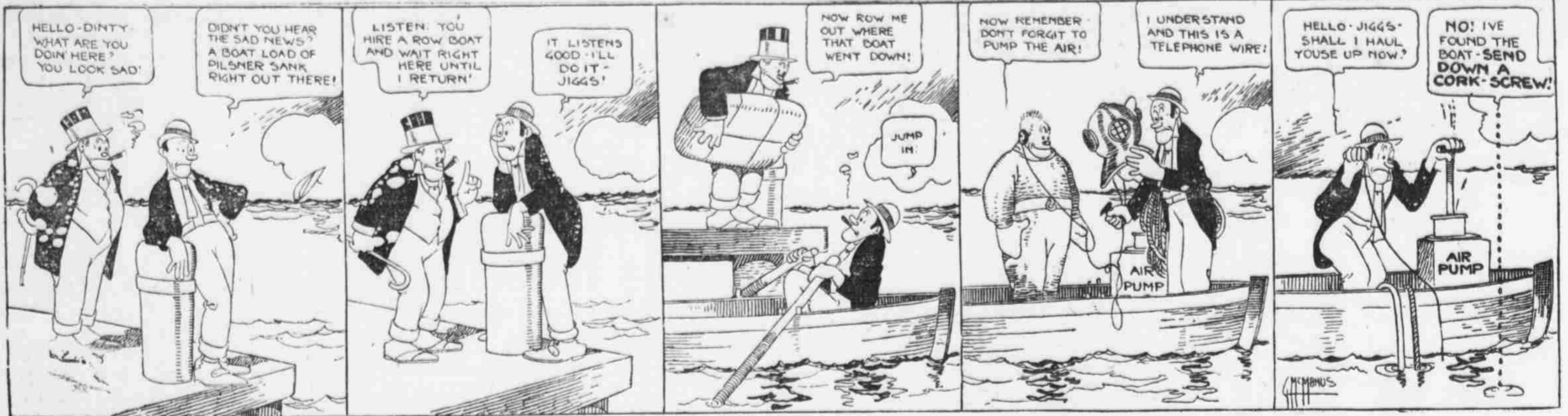

RIP HAGERMAN TO CHIPEDS

Star Pitcher of Cleveland Naps Signs with Tinx.

TERMS ARE NOT MADE PUBLIC

Hurler Disciplined When Informers Reported to Birmingham that Outlaw Scouts Confer with Him.

CHICAGO, Nov. 25.—Rip Hagerman, star pitcher of the Cleveland American league ball club, today signed a three-year contract with the Chicago Federal league club, according to an announcement by Charles Weegman, president of the club. The terms were not made public. Hagerman had been disciplined by Cleveland, he said, when informers had reported to Manager Birmingham that Federal league scouts had been seen talking with the pitcher. "Birmingham asked me to sign a two years' contract," said Hagerman, "and I refused. I immediately became the warm-up pitcher. I pitched to the batters, and when our other pitchers got in trouble I was rushed to the side line to warm up to relieve him. If I'd gone back to Cleveland I'd soon have been sent to Portland."

Hagerman formerly pitched for Portland, Ore., and at one time for the Chicago Nationals.

Fischer Upsets Trade.

In a letter from Binghamton, N. Y., last week Bill Fischer, catcher for the Brooklyn Dodgers, announced that he had signed with the Chicago Federals on a three years' contract calling for \$5,000 a season. Fischer says he got \$2,000 in advance. Charles H. Ebbets, president of the Dodgers, had decided to trade Fischer for a pitcher and made the announcement less than twenty-four hours before Fischer's jump to the Chifeds was recorded.

mitting defeat, Creighton will give them a hard run for their money. Out at Rourke park the Omaha high school will lock with Lane Tech. of Chicago. Though of lighter caliber than the Coyote-Creighton fray, the inter-scholastic lads should give an interesting exhibit of the gridiron game. The Lane team is reputed to be a wonder this year, but Tommie Mills and his boys will be there to make them prove it.

To Loop the Loop.

A variety of attractions will be offered at the Speedway. Art Smith, who loops the loop a la Beachey, will be on hand to provide the thrills whenever the crowd wants them. He will be given expert assistance by Charles Peters, Ralph McMillen and Charles Osborn, three brother aviators.

Motorcycle racing, with J. A. McNeil, Morry Graves, Larry Fleckenstein, Roy Milner, Dave Kinne and Dutch Meyers competing, and automobile time trials will make up the rest of the program. The Speedway will be opened shortly after 10:30 in the morning and the preliminary events inaugurated immediately. Continuously from that time until 5 o'clock in the afternoon events will be run off.

The management is expecting a record crowd to attend. The track has been completed to a twenty-foot width. This will be widened to fifty feet next spring, but in order to give Omaha an idea of the enormity of the enterprise it was decided to build the twenty feet this fall so that an opening could be had. The opening today is to show what can be done on the track.

Two selected teams of Omaha's best soccer players will exhibit at Miller park. Interest in soccer is rapidly growing in Omaha and the teams in the City league had well defined followings. A cross-country run will be held under the auspices of the Young Men's Christian association. The run will be held in the morning. A gold medal will be given to the winner and a sterling silver medal to the lad coming home second. The following eight will receive bronze medals.

On all the sand lots the various amateur foot ball teams will settle feuds of long standing. The Columbians and the Monmouth Parks, the two fastest of Omaha's amateur teams, will invade foreign fields. The Monmouth Parks will play at Valley and the Columbians at Missouri Valley.

A Thanksgiving day shoot will be the program at Carter Lake Gun club. The events will start promptly at 10 o'clock in the morning and continue throughout the day. The Omaha Gun club will not hold a shoot, but will be present by invitation at the doings at the Carter Lake club.

If the day is pleasant the old guard of golfers will dig up the old clubs and hit themselves around the golf links at the various country clubs. ACCIDENT AT THE SPEEDWAY

Ernest Magruder Hurtles from Track When Tire Bursts.

ART SMITH LOOPS OVER CITY

Daring Aviator Performs Miracle of the Air Over Omaha, Looping the Loop Nineteen Times.

Ernest Magruder, an expert from the National factory, drove the first racing car on the new Omaha Automobile speedway yesterday afternoon, and also suffered the first accident. Magruder had driven his big National three-quarters of the way around the track when he was seen to hurdle off. He declared he blew a tire and was thrown off.

Magruder was not injured, and the only damage done to the machine was the twisting of the steering gear and the axle. A new axle was attached last night and the car will be ready today, and Magruder will make another attempt. Magruder had trouble in starting. His engine wouldn't accumulate the speed and when he struck the first banked turn he swayed perilously, and was forced to point the nose of the car toward the top of the track to prevent sliding off at the bottom. Two or three times he nearly hurdled over the top when he pushed the machine upward.

Art Smith Loops Over City.

Art Smith, the daring little aviator who performs loop-the-loops in the atmosphere, exhibited his prowess over the city making numerous loops over the building tops during the twenty-minute he remained in the air.

Despite the powerful wind Smith took the chance just to prove to Omaha that Beachey has nothing on him. The wind, driving in from the west, propelled his skippy machine over Council Bluffs and it took him many minutes to work back over Omaha. Then he made twelve successive loops.

On each loop the wind drove him back toward the Bluffs and on several occasions he attempted loops only to have the wind throw him backward, but he gamely stuck to it, returned to Omaha and went through seven more loops, making a total of nineteen loops.

Leaves Gas Tank Home.

Just before going up Smith discovered he had left his gas tank at Fort Wayne. The tank from Pete Loch's machine was installed and Smith went up anyhow. Ralph McMillen went into the air and remained up thirty-five minutes. When \$300 feet above the very center of Omaha's business district, McMillen's last drop of gas was consumed and he was in the air without means of propelling himself back to the Automobile Speedway. But by skillful voliplanning, McMillen brought his machine to the ground and landed in a large field south of the Speedway, uninjured and ready to make another flight in the afternoon.

Will Break Loop Record.

Today at the Automobile Speedway Smith will attempt to break his record for the number of consecutive loops. He has maneuvered sixteen successive loops and he hopes to be able to do better this afternoon. Beachey's record is considerably under the one now held by Smith.

Charles Peters, who flies the Loch machine, may go up with Smith when he loops this afternoon. Looping with a passenger is very dangerous and has only been attempted once or twice before.

The program at the Speedway will start this morning at 10:30 o'clock. Smith will loop both in the morning and afternoon. In addition McMillen will fly, automobile tests against time will be run and a series of motorcycle races will conclude the program.

Schipke Signs Up With Salt Lake Team

Bill Schipke, who has been a hero to Rourke fans for some ten years, has the promise of a neat job next summer. Schipke has made arrangements to hook up with Salt Lake City in case that town can get into a respectable league next summer. Salt Lake City is one of the cities in the defunct Union association territory. Ship will probably manage the team in case a club is placed in that territory.

FONTENELLES WANT FOOT BALL GAME FOR TURKEY DAY

The Fontenelles, one of Omaha's fast foot ball teams, invaded Dunlap, Ia., and although outweighed some twelve pounds to the man, defeated the Hawkeyes, 14 to 13. The Dunlap boys were held scoreless until the last quarter, when they rushed two touchdowns and kicked one goal. The Fontenelles had made a touchdown early in the first quarter and again in the third quarter and kicked both goals. The Dunlap team is without a game for Thanksgiving and would like to hear from some fast Omaha squad. W. Wettenal, Dunlap, Ia., is manager.

Braves Will Train at Macon. MACON, Ga., Nov. 25.—George Stallings, manager of the Boston National world's champions, announced here today that Macon had been chosen as the 1915 training camp for his team. He said the players would report the latter part of February.

Stiehm Will Not Leave Happy Home Of Cornhuskers

LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 25.—(Special Telegram.)—Immediately upon his return from Chicago today, Coach "Jumbo" Stiehm set at rest rumors that he was to be chosen as athletic coach at the University of Wisconsin. Stiehm said he had received no direct offer from Wisconsin, but had been informed his name has been proposed by alumni who were dissatisfied with the present athletic situation there.

Stiehm said that he would not accept the position and that he has a three-year contract signed with Nebraska. The Nebraska coach spent three days in Chicago after the Iowa game, but made no attempt to arrange a schedule. He said he had taken no action on a new schedule. Manager Reed announced today receipts for the foot ball season would be about \$25,000, about \$5,000 under a year ago, but as expenses are lighter the net earnings will only be about \$1,000 lower than in 1913. The Kansas and Iowa games netted Nebraska well, but the Michigan Aggie game in Lincoln failed to come up to expectations.

Brickley May Coach Ames Next Year

IOWA CITY, Ia., Nov. 25.—(Special.)—Brickley, whose toe made Harvard foot ball famous, may coach at Ames next year, according to word which has been received by Iowa athletic authorities from the Iowa State college board. Two members of the Ames athletic board chosen as a committee of the school are now on their way to Cambridge to meet Brickley and talk the matter over with him, says the report received here. Brickley will be offered \$2,500 for the first season, it is said, with a contract practically of his own dictation for one or five years. The bringing of Brickley to Ames, if such event results, means a revolution of foot ball at Ames from a system which has been under criticism there for several years.

THOMASON PUTS BROTHER ON GRAND ISLAND TEAM

Artie Thomason, the well known walking delegate who occupies the center garden for the Omaha base ball team, has a kid brother whom, Tommie says, is a swell athlete. Thomason got the kid brother a job with the Grand Island State league club under Jim Rourke, and he predicts that in due course of time under proper training he will become a regular Ty Cobb. If the brother makes good with Grand Island he will probably come to the Rourke squad, where he can play next to the popular Tommie.

Hard Battle Expected When Two University Teams Meet on Gridiron.

COACH MILLER NOT TALKING

Betting Odds Are Said to Be Slightly in Favor of the Men from the South Dakota School.

Tickets for the big game are selling at a rapid rate, and a crowd of 5,000 people is counted on. The middle section of the grandstand has been reserved. A large number of the students will gather under the direction of the cheer leaders in the east bleachers.

When asked concerning the outcome, Coach Miller of Creighton stated that it would be a hard game and merely smiled.
