Culls from the Wire

The American transport Buford, with 82 men on board for service in the canal zone, has arrived at Colon. One woman and four men were injured, two probably fatally, in a Portland, Ore. hotel fire. Miss Iva Jantla was probably fatally burned. Charles Baker's back and feet were so severely crushed in leaping from a second-story window that he is not expected to recover. A. A. Boggs, Florida attorney, and his daughter, Marjorie, 18, were found murdered in the charred ruins of their country home near Miami, Fla. The residence had been set on fire with the evident intention of concealing the crime. Mystery surrounds the crime and the motive. The skulls of both victims had been crushed by some heavy blunt instrument. Three hundred thousand dollars, divided equally among the Chicago Art Institute, the Home for Destitute Crippled Children and the Mary Thompson hospital, is provided for in the will of the late Chicago capitalist, Alexander A. McKay. The remainder of his \$2,000,000 estate goes to relatives and friends.
