Men in Charge of Santa Claus Ship Guests of Americans.

O'LOUGHLIN MAKES ADDRESS

Journalist Describes Enthusiasm of American Women and Children Who Contributed to the Enterprise.

LONDON, Nov. 27.—There was a large gathering at the American Luncheon club today at a repast given in honor of the arrival at Devonport this week of the Christmas ship Jason, bringing Christmas presents from the children of America to the young folk of the warring countries of Europe.

John Callan O'Loughlin, representing the newspapers in the United States which aided in collecting the presents sent by the children of America, was the guest of honor. The Jason is preparing to leave Devonport tomorrow for France, and consequently its officers could not be present.

Walter Hines Page, the American ambassador, presided. Among those present were Lord Northcliffe, Sir George Riddell and Robert P. Skinner, the American consul general. Mr. O'Loughlin described the organization of the enterprise and the enthusiasm with which American women and children contributed to the unique undertaking. Sir George Riddell expressed the appreciation of Great Britain. He said Americans were noted for their original ideas and the enthusiasm with which they carried them out.

Mr. Page explained that the British government had taken charge of the gifts, and that they would be distributed through the British and Belgian relief committees.

Army Aviators to Be Given Tests Under a Warlike Condition

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—Aerial reconnaissance work in which actual warlike conditions will be simulated as far as possible is to be the test for army aviators this year, who will enter the contest for the Mackay trophy, presented several years ago by Clarence H. Mackay through the Aero Club of America. It is awarded annually for the best record in carrying out certain prescribed conditions. It was announced at the War department today that marine aviators and cavalry will be moving about the territory over which the aviators must fly.

The contest will be held near San Diego, Cal., about December 15 and will be participated in by the Fourth regiment of marines, the artillery garrison from Fort Rosecrans and a squadron of cavalry from San Ysidro, Cal. The reconnaissance is to start from a point about 100 miles from San Diego. The goal of each flight is to be maintained near San Diego, on which is located the army aviation school.

The cup is to be competed for by teams, each composed of a pilot and an observer. Accuracy of location of the troops below, with their composition and strength, also the time required to make the flight, will be counted in the judging. As complete a report as possible with a map must be submitted at the terminus. Fifteen minutes before starting each team will be given a copy of the instructions. Flights will be disqualified if they get below 2,500 feet and for every minute they are below 3,000 feet points will be deducted. There will be five judges, three representing the War department and two the Aero Club of America.

Head of Latter Day Saints Church is Reported Dying

INDEPENDENCE, Mo., Nov. 27.—There was no change today in the condition of Joseph Smith, president of the Reorganized Church of Latter Day Saints, who is near death at his home here from heart disease. The aged head of the church was stricken several days ago, but news of his illness was withheld. However, members of the family admitted his condition was alarming.

President Smith is 82 years old and for several months has been in ill health. Mr. Smith is a son of Joseph B. Smith, founder of the Mormon church.

He was born in Kirtland, O., in 1823 and educated at Nauvoo, Ill. When the main body of the Mormons migrated to Utah, he remained with the family of his mother, Mrs. Emma Hale Smith.

He was opposed to polygamy and in 1890 became president of the reorganized church, which did not affiliate with the Utah church. He was editor of the Saints' Herald, the organ of his denomination.

Carranza Arrests Mexican Employed by General Funston

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—Despite Carranza's guarantee that Mexicans employed by Major General Funston in the administration of Vera Cruz would not be molested, the arrest of one such Mexican was reported to the State department today by Consul Canada. No details were given. The new civil government at Vera Cruz has been announced, but has not yet been put in full operation.

Consul Canada reports the police still apparently are under military control. Continued quiet prevails and Generals Aguilar and Martinez have reiterated Carranza's promise of protection for American life and property.

Communication is slow from Mexico City and officials today expressed the opinion that Villa probably already has entered the capital.

British Collier Khartoum Blown Up

LONDON, Nov. 27.—The British admiralty this evening announced that the collier Khartoum had been blown up today by a mine off Grimaby. The crew of the Khartoum was landed at Grimaby, Grimaby is on the south bank of the Humber, fifteen miles southeast of Hull. The Khartoum was of 1,500 tons net. It was 212 feet long, forty feet beam and twenty feet deep. The vessel was built at Stockton in April, 1882.

BIG ALIMONY IS ALLOWED

Mrs. Bessie Tarry Is Given Ten Thousand Five Hundred.

ALSO PAID BY THE MONTH

And Besides This Is to Pay Nine Hundred to His Wife's Attorneys—Suit Not Contested by Dr. Tarry.

Mrs. Bessie Tarry was awarded \$10,500 alimony, one of the largest allowances of the kind ever made in a default divorce suit in the history of the local district court, when she was granted legal separation from Dr. Edward R. Tarry, medical specialist, by Judge Sutton.

Mrs. Tarry alleged in her petition that her husband earned \$12,000 a year in his practice. The court found that his possessions are worth \$2,000. He was also ordered to pay \$100 a month to his wife for one year and to pay a fee of \$500 to his wife's attorneys.

Thirty-Five Bodies Are Recovered from Wreck of Battleship

SHEERNESS, England, Nov. 27.—Thirty bodies from the British battleship Bulwark were recovered from the river Thames today. The Bulwark was blown up off Sheerness yesterday, presumably the result of an internal explosion.

Most of the bodies so far recovered are mutilated beyond identification. Many pathetic scenes were witnessed as relatives gathered in an effort to obtain information concerning those on the ill-fated warship. Up to the present time, however, the authorities have not given out a list of the lost.

The British government while regretting its naval losses during the war, is apparently in no fear that its pre-eminence in number of fighting craft will be threatened seriously. "Britain can lose a superdreadnaught every month for twelve months without a single loss to the enemy," said Winston Spencer Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, in the House of Commons today. "And yet he is in as good a position of superiority as it was at the outbreak of the war."

Mr. Churchill added that there was no reason for nervousness or alarm regarding the British navy or the effectiveness of its work. The French navy, he said, has complete command of the Mediterranean while the Japanese navy is in control of the Pacific.

Urges Development of Trade Relations With South America

BUENOS AIRES, Nov. 27.—The Nation, referring to the presence of Dr. Romulo S. Naon, the ambassador of the Argentine republic, in Philadelphia, November 24, and his discussion of trade matters, urges the industries of the United States to take advantage of the present circumstances and develop business relations with Argentina. It says American business should send traveling men to Argentina to show their wares and give publicity to their intentions.

Austrians Repulsed by Montenegrins

PARIS, Nov. 27.—The consul general of Montenegro today gave out the following communication under date of Cetigne, November 25: "Eight Austrian battalions yesterday attacked a Montenegrin brigade near Visegrad, on the Drina river. They made every effort to drive the Montenegrins from their position, but were unsuccessful. The Montenegrins repulsed them, inflicting great losses. They burned the enemy and took large quantities of war material, as well as many prisoners."
