

ARMIES STUDYING SCHEMES

Fighting Forces in Europe Seeking Out More Effective Tactics.

USE RUSES ON EACH OTHER

Every Imaginable Trick is Employed to Get Both Either to Display Its Position or Waste Its Efforts.

LONDON, Nov. 24.—Modern fighting strategy, at first rather helpless before the aerial and artillery factors, is beginning to adapt itself to the new conditions and along the great Aisne battle front many fertile brains have been busy devising schemes to meet these problems.

According to a distinguished London surgeon, now serving as a volunteer in the Army Medical corps, the British troops have become adepts at building dummy trenches to attract the enemy's fire. These trenches are thrown up with great fidelity and dummy figures and guns are left in them, patiently awaiting the German aeroplane scouts.

Use Various Ruses.

Another favorite device is the invention of a British signaller, whereby a heliograph can be operated at a distance of two miles by means of a telegraph wire. This heliograph begins to send out messages purporting to emanate from headquarters staff, and believing they have located the brains of the British army, the German artillery devotes its attention to the spot marked by the flashes from the heliograph.

The response is almost instant and in such volume as to indicate that the Germans believe a general attack is beginning. Several times during the night these tactics are repeated.

The surgeon who has just returned from the front reports that contrary to the usual belief, the trenches are not very wet, but he believes that with the coming of the heavy winter rains conditions along the Aisne will become terrible. The tension is already so great that many have reached the snapping point until the insane ward at Netley is filled with officers and soldiers who have lost their reason when disease is added to the terror of battle.

Great Demand for Shoes for Soldiers

MANCHESTER, Nov. 21.—The Guardian calls attention to the fact that agents for American shoe manufacturers are already in England studying the situation brought about by the extraordinary demand for shoes to supply the troops and the paper products there will be another invasion of American shoes unless English firms keep their prices low and make unusual efforts to meet the immediate demand for marching boots of all sorts.

So far the British government has been forced to take almost any sort of boots it could obtain for its troops. It was impossible at the outset to stick to regulation service boots and conditions do not improve to a marked degree in spite of the fact that most manufacturers are working extra time.

MORE WORK FOR MEN IN ENGLAND SINCE WAR

LONDON, Nov. 24.—Official reports of the government show that unemployment among men is now about 1 per cent less than it was at the opening of the war. These figures are somewhat surprising in view of the fact that nearly 1,000,000 men have volunteered their services and are under training in the army.

Men who have not entered the army find little trouble now in finding work, notwithstanding the fact that thousands of places vacated by men have been filled by women. The government has hurried forward a contract for the construction of a new postoffice tube, which will give employment to thousands of men for a year or more.

PRICE OF FLOUR DOUBLES, WHILE MEAT IS LOWER

CHRISTIANIA, Nov. 21.—The price of flour has doubled since the beginning of the war and the cutting off of Norway from Russian and Austrian markets. At the same time, meats are cheaper than usual, because of curtailment of exports, meats, cattle, hogs and sheep being among those commodities whose export has been sharply restricted by recent decrees.

WORKMEN ARE SCARCE OWING TO MOBILIZATION

CHRISTIANIA, Nov. 21.—Workmen are in demand at a minimum wage of \$3 on a branch of the government-owned railroads. Difficulty is being experienced to find laborers. This shortage is said to be due in part to mobilization of the army, but it is pointed out as an indication of the prosperous condition of the country, that, with even a small percentage of the population in military workmen cannot be induced to leave the towns and cities even when offered good wages.
