RAILROADS LEARN HOW THEY MUST HELP PAY WAR TAX. The railroads have received their instructions relative to the war revenue tax that becomes effective December 1. So far as the railroads are concerned each bill of lading must carry a 1-cent revenue stamp. The shippers, consignees or agents must supply the stamps, attach and cancel them. All bonds issued after

December 1 for each \$100 face value must carry a 2-cent stamp. There is not stamp tax on regular railroad tickets, but the party occupying a seat or berth in a sleeping car must pay a 1-cent tax for each ride. While rail tickets are exempt from tax, tickets sold any place in the United States for passage on a vessel going abroad must pay a tax of \$1 where the rate is \$10 and not exceeding \$30; \$1 where the rate is \$30 and not exceeding \$50, and \$5 where it exceeds \$50.
