The defense alleges that it cannot safely go to trial for two months, because the government officials have not allowed Matters' lawyers to examine the books and papers of the wrecked bank.

for the prevention and curtailment of tuberculosis among Americans. When application is made by the local community 50 per cent of the proceeds are available for local work and the balance goes to localities where the means are short of the needs.
