

HAVRE, France, Nov. 18.—Directly following Lord Kitchener's speech at the tord mayor's banquet in London, in which he said he had 1,250,000 men ready to land in France, there has been a steady stream of transports from England to Havre. As many as 200 ships of various sizes have been lying outside the harbor at one time. Men are being landed as fast as the ships can find berths. The troops are mostly territorials, but well seasoned.
