were expectations that this market would have a heavy run on Tuesday owing to the raising of the quarantine in western lows. There was also a heavy run anticipated for Wednesday at Chicago and buyers for packing house account accordingly were inclined to go slow and feel their way on the theory that prices if not lower today would break at other points at least by Wednesday. Thus it happened that the market on beef steers, cows and heifers were generally slow, but still prices on such cattle as buyers really wanted were not much different from last week's close.

The change in quarantine regulations which allow the shipment of feeders from this market to the clean counties in quarantined states caused an increased

from this market to the clean counties in quarantined states caused an increased demand for stocker and feeder cattle this morning. The result was that prices were strong to as much as loc higher in spots. It would be well for shippers to understand that under the quarantine regulations cattle from territory formerly under quarantine can be shipped here only for immediate slaughter, which bars out all stocker or feeder cattle for quarantined territory.
