#### **FUCCIO TO GRAND JURY** FOR BLACK HAND LETTER

Frank Fuccio, an Italian, who came here from New York recently, was arranged before United States Commissioner H. S. Daniel and waived preliminary examination on the charge of using the mails for a scheme to defraud, by sending a "black hand" letter to Alflo Garrotto, 504 North Sixteenth street. Numerous dasgers, skulls and crossbones and a bleeding heart decorated the letter, which demanded that Garrotto place \$300 under the porch of a vacant building or his little daughter would be killed. Fuccio is said to have confessed sending the letter, but later denied it, when postoffice inspectors took charge of the case. He was arrested by the Omaha police, Commissioner Daniel held the man to the grand jury, and he went to jail in default of \$1,000 bond.

#### PARCEL POST TO GERMANY AND AUSTRIA IS RESUMED

Resumption of parcel post service between United States and Germany and Austria-Hungary, announced from Washington Monday, will swell the Christmas business in the Omaha postoffice, Postmaster John C. Wharton says. Every year many packages are sent from this city to those two countries, and until the embargo was just lifted, none could he sent this year,

The only countries to which packages cannot now be sent by parcel post are Belgium, Turkey and northern and northeastern France. Postal money order service is now open with Germany, but is closed to Austria-Hungary, Beigium, Turkey, Egypt and Mexico.
