PLAN FIGHT ON FEDERALS

Proposition Considered to Transfer Newark Team to Brooklyn. Ebbets Owns Newark Franchise and He Would Sell It Before Backing Two Teams on the Home Field.

AUBURN, N. Y., Dec. 2.—The National Board of Arbitration of the National Association of Professional Base Ball Leagues today gave out the following decisions relating to minor leagues in the United States and Canada: The Springfield (Ill.) franchise in the Three-I league has been transferred to Rock Island.

Newark Base Ball Team May Be Moved to Ebbets' Field

NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—Plans to continue the fight against the Federal league among others the proposal to transfer the Jersey City club to Brooklyn will be discussed at the annual meeting here next week of the National and International leagues. Advance statements from club owners of the two leagues indicate that peace negotiations have been abandoned and that the fight will be resumed next season.

NEW BUREAU FOR AUTOISTS

Omaha Auto Club Will Establish Such an Office for Tourists. Machine Owners Would License Cars According to Horsepower and Make Theft Punished More Severely.

Columbia Holds Foot Ball Rally

NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—A mass meeting of the undergraduates body, which it is hoped will lead to the restoration of varsity foot ball at Columbia university, was held this afternoon. More than 2,000 students attended and were invited to subscribe toward a foot ball fund or report as candidates for a Columbia team in 1915.

THREE NEW MEN FOR INDIANAPOLIS FEDERALS

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 2.—Three new players have been added to the Indianapolis Federal league club, according to announcement made today by J. Edward Krause, president of the club. They are Bert Padfield, a left handed pitcher of Longton, Colo., who was with the Pacific coast league two years ago, but did not play last season because of salary differences; Fred Troutman, a right hand pitcher, who won fifteen and lost eight games in the Wisconsin-Illinois league last year, and Joe Potter, a utility infielder, who played in one of the smaller western leagues last season.

West Point Farmer Killed in Runaway

WEST POINT, Neb., Dec. 2.—(Special Telegram.)—Anton Druek, a young farmer living west of the river, was instantly killed last night in a runaway. His head was found severed from his body near the river bridge. He was a widower and leaves a family of young children. His team was found some miles from the body.

PULL PRODIGAL SON STUFF

Players Dropped by Feds Knock at Doors of Organized Ball. UP TO NATIONAL COMMISSION

CHICAGO, Dec. 2.—The fate of the surplus Federal league ball players left jobless by the decision of the league to carry only twenty men for each club probably will be decided at a meeting of the National Base Ball commission in New York next Monday.

Austria Has Army of Half Million Men on the Servian Frontier

LONDON, Dec. 2.—A dispatch to the Times from Petrograd, describing Servia's plight, says: "Austria has a half million men on the Servian frontier, but the Servians were informed of this in time and were enabled to retreat into positions more convenient for defense. The Servians are now hoping that the Russians will soon appear under the walls of Budapest."

Federal Deficit for November is About Sixteen Millions

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—Customs and internal revenue received for November show a marked decrease from the same month last year. Customs receipts were \$14,924,405, compared with \$21,174,023 for November, 1913, while internal revenue receipts at \$24,369,068, were nearly \$5,000,000 less than in the same month last year. For the month the excess of ordinary disbursements over receipts was \$15,860,000, compared with an excess of the same sort last year of \$2,718,722. Income from the war tax will begin to show this month. Custom receipts, despite the comparison with November, 1913, were \$90,000 greater than in October. Gold coin and bullion in the treasury trust fund increased during the month nearly \$26,000,000.

Federal Reserves Outplay Christians

Carlisle Too Heavy for Alabama Team

BERMINGHAM, Ala., Dec. 2.—Carlisle's superior weight proved too much for the University of Alabama foot ball eleven this afternoon and the Indians easily won a 30-10 victory. Carlisle used straight line back with well regulated delayed passes, which were effective. Attempts of the Indians at forward passes netted but few gains. Alabama's play was open. Inability to cope with the Indians' defense made consistent gains impossible.

Mahan is Elected Captain of Harvard

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Dec. 2.—Edward William Mahan of North, Mass., half back on the Harvard foot ball team for the last two years, was chosen captain of the 1915 team at a meeting of the 1914 squad today. Mahan, who is in the junior class, prepared for college at Phillips-Andover academy, where he was a member of the foot ball, base ball and track teams. He captained the Andover nine and in his first year at Harvard was captain of the freshmen eleven. He is 23 years old.

Ask Funds to Buy Idle Coal Miners' Children Presents

BRIDGEFORD, O., Dec. 2.—Letters were mailed from the headquarters of the United Mine Workers of America here today to every local union of the mine workers in the United States and Canada, numbering 2,000, and to every organized labor union in Ohio and West Virginia, approximately 90, asking for donations of money to make possible the purchase of Christmas presents for the children of the 35,000 striking miners in eastern Ohio. Unless donations are made it is said that 20,000 children will receive no visit from Santa Clause. Each miner has received only \$9 benefits from the miners' organization since the strike was called, eight months ago.
