One of the most noteworthy features of the coming engagement of the San Carlo Grand Opera company in this city will be the orchestra. This department is said to be built up of the finest available material, and, under the experienced direction of Chevalier Giuseppe Angelini, one of Italy's celebrated maestros, the body of select players is said to be worth going a long way to hear.

Angelini, who directs the operas without the aid of the musical score, was formerly general musical director of the Melba Grand Opera company, which toured the world. He received many extraordinary tokens of honor, being knighted by King Victor Emmanuel of Italy for his distinguished services in that, his native country, besides being presented with valuable medals by the presidents of Columbia, Uruguay and the opera enthusiasts of Buenos Ayres. Angelini is said to be able to conduct some sixty different operas without the aid of the score.

The players in the San Carlo orchestra, seasoned and experienced opera performers, possess remarkable ability in that their instruments, as a rule, are of superior quality. Many of the players are soloists of greater attainment than some who tour the country as concert artists.
