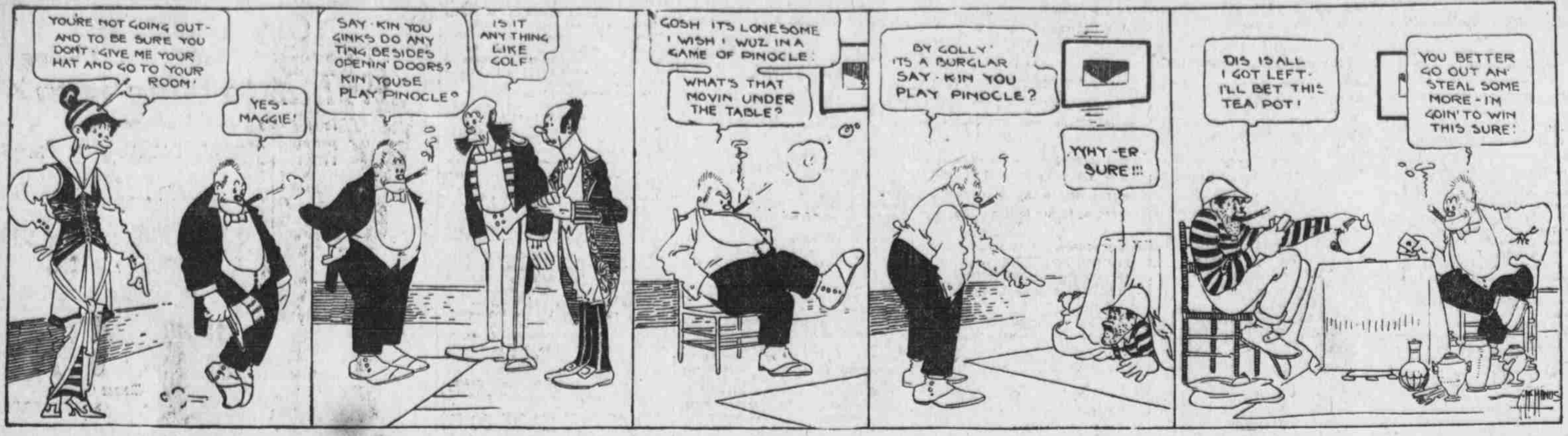

Gus stole thirty-five bases in 147 games last year, according to the averages just published. But it is not in total bases stolen that Gus leads; it is in successful attempts. The percentage of steals attempted by Gus to attempts is .59. Cobb's percentage is under .50, so it can be seen just how the Omaha led in a regular season on the path.
