BOTH ARE TAKEN TO HOSPITAL

MRS. DUNCAN DEAD,

Wife Dies and Husband So Sick He Cannot Be Told of Her Death-Former Employe of the Water Company.

Robert Duncan, city Inspector in the department of public improvements and former city plumbing inspector, is at the point of death in St. Joseph's hospital, where his wife lies dead. Mrs. Duncan

Mr. Duncan suffered a paralytic stroke at his home, 2628 Davenport street, Monday. His wife, ill in bed, was unable to help him as he lay unconscious on the floor. Mrs. Thomas McGovern, wife of the city councilman, discovered them there.
